FW's Rev. Albert Chew to be honored at Brite's first State of the Black Church Summit and Awards Banquet

BLACK CHURCH SCHOLARS, ADVOCATES, preachers, churchgoers and students are expected to convene on campus Friday, April 1 for a State of the Black Church Summit and Awards Banquet. Sponsors of this inaugural two-part event include Brite Divinity School, TCU's Office of Diversity and Community, the Fort Worth chapter of The Links Incorporated, the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, the office of African American Ministries for the Catholic Diocese of Fort Worth and attorney Glen Lewis.

Honored guest at the day's events is the Rev. Albert Chew, longtime pastor of Shiloh Missionary Baptist Church in Fort Worth.

Theme of the summit meeting, set for 11:30 a.m. - 2 p.m. at the Kelly Center is "Bearing Witness to Tradition and Professing Liberation." Registration fee for this panel discussion and luncheon will be \$15 per person. Among the panelists will be the awards banquet keynote speaker Dr. James H. Cone, professor of systemic theology at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. An ordained A.M.E. minister and pioneer in the field of Black liberation theology, Dr. Cone has spent the past 30 years addressing the challenges and promises of the Black church in today's society.

Cone is the author of 11 books and more than 150 articles in which he addresses the problems of white supremacy and poverty as they manifest themselves in theology, education, culture and society. Joining Dr. Cone and awards banquet honoree Rev. Chew as panelists will be:

- Rev. Dr. Darryl Trimiew, professor of ethics and former dean of Black Church Studies at Colgate Rochester Divinity School and Disciples of Christ pastor, Rochester, NY

Moderators for the panel discussion and community feedback session will Dr. Stacey Floyd-Thomas, assistant professor of ethics and Black Church Studies at Brite, and Dr. Juan Floyd-

Thomas, assistant professor of history at TCU.

The Awards Banquet will be from 6:30 - 9 p.m. at the Kelly Center, and will be a formal dinner honoring Dr. Chew as recipient of the 2005 Brite Divinity School "Black Church Leader" Award. The event is \$125 per person or \$1,000 for a table of eight.

A renowned leader within the National Baptist Convention of America and the Missionary Baptist General Convention of Texas, Dr. Chew's ministry was established in Fort Worth more than 46 years ago. He is an alumnus of Bishop College, Prairie View A&M and Brite Divinity School.

As a son of a Baptist minister, loving husband and father of four, Dr. Chew exemplifies the traditional tenets of a Black church leader - connecting, creating, equipping and teaching Black Christians how to lay solid foundations upon which future generations will build strong families, communities and institutions.

Computer Science hosting security expert critical of Homeland Security policies

MARCUS J. RANUM, A WORLD-RENOWNED expert on security system design and implementation, will be the featured speaker at two lectures on campus this week. He is the Cecil and Ida Green Chair Lecturer for computer science.

Ranum's first lecture is titled "Hacking and Terrorism: The Problem of Defending an Infinite-Length Wall." The event will be held Tuesday in Tucker Technology Center rm. 139 at 3:30 p.m.

A second lecture is scheduled for Wednesday at 7 p.m. in Sid Richardson LH 3. The topic will be "Homeland Security: The Digital Pearl Harbor."

Known as an outspoken critic of Homeland Security policies, Ranum is recognized as the inventor of the proxy firewall and implementer of the first commercial firewall. He is currently chief of security at Tenable Security, Inc. and has served as a consultant to many Fortune 500 companies and governments.
