Economic historian Stanley Engerman will speak at Honors Convocation April 7

ECONOMIC HISTORIAN AND PHI Beta Kappa Visiting Scholar Stanley L. Engerman will be guest speaker at the 43rd annual Honors Convocation Thursday, April 7. The program begins at 11 a.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium with a procession of TCU faculty and Honors students in academic regalia.

Peggy Watson (director, honors program) will preside at the event, which is free and open to the public. **Stephen Quinn** (economics) will introduce Dr. Engerman's address, titled "Slavery in World History." Dr. Engerman is a professor both of economics and history at the University of Rochester in upstate New York. In his long career, he has written extensively on the economic impact of slavery in America, as well as in other nations historically involved in the slave trade.

Chancellor Victor J. Boschini Jr. will announce the electees of Phi Beta Kappa and Dr. Watson will announce the winner of the Honors Scholar Award.

Part of the Convocation program includes naming the recipient of the 2005 Honors Faculty Recognition Award. Honors student **Andrea Wilson** will make that presentation. Also participating are voice professor **Sheila Allen** leading the singing of the alma mater and **Joe Butler**, University organist, providing additional music.

An Honors Banquet at 6:30 p.m. that evening in the Student Center ballroom will recognize **Blake Hestir** (philosophy) who was named Honors Professor of the Year during last year's event.

Other Honors Week activities include the presentation of Senior Honors Projects from 2 - 5 p.m. April 4 - 5 in the Roach Conference Room of Tucker Technology Center, an Honors Recital for music students at 7:30 p.m. tonight in PepsiCo Recital Hall and a special program on "Can A Corporation Have A Conscience?" at 5 p.m. April 6 in the Bass Living Room. Guest speaker is Dr. Ken Goodpaster.

"This new alignment allows us to better address student needs and continue to move toward our goal of becoming a premier journalism school," said **Tommy Thomason** (director, Schieffer School) "It also puts us in the rare position of being one of only a few journalism schools in the nation with a department of advertising and public relations."

The department of broadcast news-editorial journalism offers three majors, broadcast journalism, international news/editorial journalism, and news-editorial journalism. News-editorial majors can specialize in newspapers, magazines, photojournalism and publication design. The department of advertising/public relations offers two majors, ad/pr and global ad/pr. ♦
