Commencement, by the numbers, reveals what (who) TCU is made of

AS OF PRESSTIME, A TOTAL OF 1,282 STUDENTS are expected to graduate Saturday during the 2 p.m. Commencement ceremony at Fort Worth Convention Center downtown.

The number of degree candidates, about 100 more than a year ago, makes this TCU's largest graduating class. Of those, 1,002 are baccalaureate candidates (15 students will receive double degrees), 234 will receive master's degrees and four are Ph.D. candidates from AddRan College of Arts and Sciences.

Brite Divinity School has 42 graduates (two Ph.D.s, one D.Min. candidate and the rest receiving master's degrees).

There are 326 students set to graduate with Latin Honors, including 14 with a 4.0 GPA.

As far as the geographic makeup of the graduating class, there are 966 from Texas, as well as 38 other states represented. There are 63

international students graduating, representing 34 foreign countries.

The Commencement ceremony will begin with a flag procession. In addition to the platform party, faculty and students processing into the arena, members of the TCU Class of '55 will participate. The group is celebrating their 50th reunion this weekend and will join in the graduation procession as part of their planned activities.

John Roach, retiring chairman of the TCU board of trustees, will deliver Commencement remarks. The TCU Commencement Band, conducted by Bobby Francis, will play. Sarah Klopfenstine, a graduating senior voice major, will lead the singing of the hymn and the TCU alma mater.

Rising piano stars, teachers, amateurs to attend Cliburn Institute

INSPIRING THE YOUNG AND HOPEFUL. Stimulating the longtime teacher. Affirming the amateur. Each year, the TCU/Cliburn Piano Institute invites students like these to immerse themselves in the study of piano performance, technique and repertoire with world-class professionals.

The Institute unfolds on campus every summer, and will be in session this year now through June 11. There are 38 young performers attending, selected by audition from the major music conservatories of the world, and about two dozen more coming just to observe. There are also 40 piano teachers from across the country enrolled, including 13 slated to perform in a recital May 25. Many teachers who will be here teach piano at other universities.

Founded in 1981 by Tamás Ungár (School of Music), the Institute is a cooperative venture between TCU and the Cliburn Foundation and remains under the guidance of Tamás. This year, the 12th Van Cliburn International Piano Competition will be unfolding May 20 at Bass

Performance Hall downtown, giving the Institute participants the added opportunity to attend this world-class event.

The Institute's private lessons and master classes, taught by a distinguished faculty of international pianists, teachers, conductors and composers, are at the heart of the Young Artists Program. Master classes, held in PepsiCo Recital Hall, are open to the public. General admission, payable at the door, is \$15, or \$10 for students with I.D.

TCU dance students to perform in Japan
