Department Green Honors Chair nominations announced for this year

A NUMBER OF PROMINENT SCHOLARS WILL be on campus this year as visiting Green Honors Professors, a program established by the late Drs. Cecil H. and Ida Green of Dallas.

AddRan College will host Winton U. Solberg, emeritus professor of history at the University of Illinois, Oct. 11-13. Author of seven books and numerous articles, he specializes in American intellectual history. He will give a public lecture on "The Promise of America Revisited" at 6:30 p.m. Oct. 11 at the Kelly Center.

The political science department has invited Dr. Andrew J. Nathan, professor of political science at Columbia University. He will talk on "The Rise of China: Looming Threat or Status Quo Power" at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 1 at the Kelly Center.

Green Chair for the Schieffer School of Journalism will be Tom Duncan, founder and first director of the Integrated Marketing Communication graduate program at the University of Colorado. He will be on campus Nov. 3-4, during which time he will speak in several classes and hold a forum open to area public relations professionals.

The School of Education will welcome Ms. Insoo Kim Berg Feb. 6-8. She has been a co-collaborator in research, creation and application of solution-focused therapy in the training of counselors and social workers.

Juilliard composer Eric Ewazen will visit the School of Music Feb. 6-9 for a series of private lessons, masterclasses, chamber music recital and Wind Symphony/Symphonic Band concert of his music.

Prof. Lucha Corpi will be on campus Feb. 7-11 at the invitation of Spanish & Latin American Studies. She is a poet, but is best known for her detective novels which feature the Latina detective "Gloria Damasco".

Economics has invited Richard Ingersoll, professor of education and sociology at the University of Pennsylvania. He will be here Feb. 15-17.

History is hosting Michael Birkner Feb. 21-23. He is a liberal arts professor at Gettysburg College and has written books and articles on American political history.

Green Chair for the biology department will be Massimo Pigliucci, from the department of ecology and evolution at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. He will be on campus March 27-29.

Owen Flanagan has accepted the philosophy department's invitation and will be here to

lecture March 29-31. He is both a professor of philosophy and of psychology and brain sciences and neurobiology at Duke University.

April 17-18, the English department will welcome Stanford University English professor Andrea A. Lunsford. She is director of the Program in Writing and Rhetoric there.

As yet unscheduled is a visit from the Green Chair chosen by the geology department, conservationist J. Michael Fay, conservation fellow with the National Geographic Society. ♦

Watch the Horned Frog Marching Band on ESPN, at soccer game in Mexico

IF YOU'RE TUNED INTO A MEXICAN SOCCER match on ESPN Saturday afternoon, don't be surprised to hear the *TCU Fight Song* during the halftime show. The 250-member Horned Frog Band, colorguard, drum line, TCU Showgirls and cheerleaders have been invited to Monterrey, Mexico to perform during the Sept. 24 game between the UANL Tigres and the Monterrey Rayados.

The 12-minute halftime show will be televised worldwide, at approximately 5:45 CDT. The program will include the team song of each soccer rival, as well as our fight song and pre-game favorites like *Deep in the Heart of Texas*.

Funding for the trip is provided by FEMSA, the largest beverage distribution company in Mexico. The TCU group leaves here Friday morning in six buses and will return Sunday evening.

Bobby Francis (director of bands) says the invitation came less than three weeks ago, prompting quick response in making all the arrangements. Now that it's set, the students are very excited about the travel opportunity, and a chance to perform before a global audience. "They'll also be staying in five-star hotels and having great meals," adds **Brian Youngblood** (associate director of bands). Other staff accompanying the group include **James McNair**, **Brian West** and **Hector Gil** (School of Music), **Jeff Tucker** (cheerleader coach) and a number of graduate assistants. ♦
