Campus to celebrate Homecoming and 50 years of Greek life

THE TCU COMMUNITY KICKS OFF HOMECOMING 2005 and 50 years of Greek life with an educational event, "Fraternity & Sorority Life: Uncensored, an Ethical Discussion of the Role of Fraternities & Sororities on a College Campus," at 11:30 a.m. Friday at the Kelly Center. The Greek 50th Anniversary will recognize the four principles of fraternity and sorority life with service, education, social and philanthropy activities during Homecoming 2005.

"The mission of the Greeks is similar to the mission of TCU," said **Susan Adams**, (campus life). "The Greeks strive to promote leadership, scholarship and service and provide brotherhood and sisterhood for members."

Friday's Homecoming activities also include campus tours, FrogFest, parade, pep rally and fireworks. The weekend continues on Saturday with a master plan overview, fraternity and sorority open houses, Horned Frog Village, Homecoming barbecue, alumni reunion gatherings and the big football game between TCU and Army. There also will be a Greek 50th Anniversary Celebration after the game at the Kelly Center.

Adam Clymer to speak tonight

FORMER NEW YORK TIMES CHIEF WASHINGTON correspondent Adam Clymer will talk about a lifetime of covering politics when he speaks at 7 p.m. this evening in 320 Moudy Bldg. S, rm. 320. The talk is free and open to the public.

His topic is "A Newspaper Meets Such Interesting People: Khrushchev to Wallace, the Kennedys to Gingrich." He will be on campus today and tomorrow, visiting with students and faculty of the Schieffer School of Journalism.

At *The New York Times*, Clymer wrote on major issues in government and politics from privacy to campaign finance. The American Political Science Association has honored him with its Carey McWilliams Award for distinguished correspondence.

After his retirement from *The Times*, he served until July 2005 as political director of the National Annenberg Election Survey, a project of the University of Pennsylvania's Annenberg Public Policy Center. He contributed to *Reagan: The Man, The President*, a book by *Times* reporters published in 1981. His highly praised *Edward M. Kennedy: A Biography* was published in 1999 by William Morrow & Co. ♦

TCU ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR OF ART **Susan Harrington** presents a 12-year survey of her drawings and encaustic paintings while living in Texas and in Nuremberg, Germany. The exhibition, titled "Meander," will be up today - Nov. 3 in the University Art Gallery.

An opening reception will be from 5-7 p.m. today in the foyer.

Susan says she works with transparent and layered images because they are a lot like memories. "Memory is multi-layered and often transformed as well as partially obscured from one to the next over time."

Harrington's many honors include: the Pollack-Krasner Foundation Fellowship, 1999-2000; several residencies at the Vermont Studio Center and Artist-in-Residence at The Santa Fe Art Institute. Harrington has taught drawing and painting at TCU since 1988. ♦
