THE SCHIEFFER SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM will hold its 2nd annual Schieffer Symposium Wednesday, April 5 at 7 p.m. in the Student Center ballroom. Title is "The Changing Communications Landscape."

Panelists include Bob Schieffer, chief Washington correspondent for CBS News, interim CBS Evening News anchor and moderator of Face the Nation as well as 1959 TCU graduate; Jill Abramson, managing editor of The New York Times; Larry Kramer, founder of Marketwatch.com and president of CBS Digital Media; Judy Woodruff, former anchor of CNN's Inside Politics and correspondent for PBS' The NewsHour with Jim Lehrer; and Len Downie, executive editor of The Washington Post.

## Brite's second annual "State of the Black Church" Summit set for March 24 at Kelly Center

BLACKCHURCH SCHOLARS, CHURCH LEADERS, students and members of the community are expected to convene on campus Friday, March 24 for the second annual "State of the Black Church" Summit and Awards Banquet, sponsored by Brite Divinity School and TCU.

Theme of the summit meeting, set for 11:30 a.m. - 2 p.m. at the Kelly Center, is "Linking Divine Justice to Social Justice." Registration fee for the panel discussion and luncheon will be \$15 per person.

The Awards Banquet, set for 6:30 - 9:30 p.m. at the Kelly Center, will honor Rev. Dr. Zan Wesley Holmes Jr. as recipient of the 2006 Brite Divinity School "Black Church Leader" Award. He is pastor emeritus of St. Luke "Community" United Methodist Church of Dallas where he served for 28 years. Son of a Methodist pastor, Holmes earned two degrees from Perkins School of Theology at SMU. His 43-year ministry made him one of United Methodist's most influential pastors.

Also at the banquet, \$1,000 scholarships will be presented both to a deserving high school senior and to a Brite seminarian. Banquet price is \$125 per person, or \$1,000 for a table of eight.

Keynote speaker is Rev. Dr. Robert Michael Franklin Jr., distinguished professor of social ethics at Candler School of Theology at Emory University in Atlanta. His many books and articles about the black church and social justice make him a frequent guest commentator on CNN and NPR.

## TCU Artist Diploma graduate at 18, Adam Golka will perform all 32 Beethoven Piano Sonatas here

AT AGE 18, WHEN MOST YOUNG PEOPLE are headed off to college or beginning a job, recent TCU Artist Diploma graduate Adam Golka will spend the year performing Ludwig van Beethoven's 32 *Piano Sonatas* at nine free, public concerts on the TCU campus.

The series, sponsored by the School of Music, will be held in Ed Landreth Auditorium, beginning Sunday, March 19. Four recitals are scheduled for spring, and the remaining five will be held next fall. Golka will present the sonatas in the order Beethoven composed

them, beginning in 1795. Details for the upcoming concert dates are:

**Sunday, March 19, 2:30 p.m.** - Three Sonatas op. 2

**Tuesday, April 11, 7:30 p.m.** - Sonata op. 7, Three Sonatas op. 10

**Tuesday, May 9, 7:30 p.m.** - Sonata op. 13 "Pathétique," Two Sonatas op. 14, Sonata op. 22

**Wednesday, May 31, 7:30 p.m.** - Sonata op. 26, Two Sonatas "quasi fantasia" op. 27 (including the "Moonlight" Sonata), Sonata op. 28 "Pastoral"

The schedule of fall concerts for the remaining 17 sonatas will be announced in late summer.

A first-generation American, Golka is the son of musicians who fled Communist-controlled Poland in the 1980s in search of a better life. He attended public school in Katy, TX, until eighth grade when his family opted for home-schooling. At 15, he moved to Fort Worth to study in TCU's Artist Diploma Program under **José Feghali** (School of Music), noted Brazilian-born pianist and gold medal winner of the 1985 Van Cliburn International Piano Competition.

Golka already has nearly 150 concerto performances behind him, including well-reviewed appearances with the Houston, Dallas, San Diego and Fort Worth symphonies, the Shanghai Philharmonic and Sinfonia Varsovia. His international career began at age 16 when he won the gold medal at the 2nd China Shanghai International Piano Competition. He also took the "audience favorite" award after his final-round performance of Rachmaninoff's *Third Piano Concerto*.

(**John Owings**, a member of the TCU School of Music piano faculty since 1990, received the Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Research and Creative Activity in 1993 for his performances of the 32 Beethoven *Piano Sonatas*.) ♦

Author of numerous books, articles, essays and peer-reviewed papers, Pigliucci holds a Ph.D. in genetics, botany and philosophy. He has served as a professor of botany, ecology and evolutionary biology at several universities in the United States and in Europe. He is currently an associate professor in the department of Ecology & Evolution at State University of New York at Stony Brook.
