TCU hosts annual Health Fair

THE TCU DEPARTMENTS OF HEALTH promotions and campus recreation are co-sponsoring the 2006 TCU Health Fair, Friday, Nov. 10 in the University Recreation Center from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The first 400 TCU faculty and staff who attend will receive free flu shots. After the first 400 people, flu shots will be offered for \$25 per person. In addition, free cholesterol and body composition testing will be available at the event. In order to get the most accurate cholesterol results, fasting for 12 hours prior to the test is recommended.

Flu shots are available for students at the Brown-Lupton Health Center for \$20 per person.

"The TCU Health Fair is an attempt to broaden the scope of health beyond fitness and exercise," said Steve Kintigh. "We will have booths ranging from vegetarian interests to bone marrow donations, tai chi to yoga, as well as standard physical measurements like blood pressure, body composition and cholesterol checks."

The TCU Health Fair is offering free health screenings, organ donation sign up, volunteer opportunities and information and literature on a variety of organizations including health care providers, wellness businesses, volunteer organizations and spas.

The program, titled *Live@DanceTCU*, will feature premieres by Ballet & Modern Dance faculty. **Li-Chou Cheng**, professor of professional practice, is restaging Act II of the classic ballet *Giselle*. *Giselle*, first produced in 1842, is still considered the very essence of the romantic ballet.

In addition, guest choreographer Michelle Dexter will restage her high-energy work *Chula*. The concert features lighting design by **Roma Flowers**.

Pessoa is the title of this modern dance choreographed by **Susan Douglas Roberts**. *Pessoa* also refers to the poet's name, and is the Portuguese word for "person." *Ode: Killer Bees, Y2K, and the right to a fully-automated kitchen*, created by **Andrea Harris** and the dancers in the work, takes a tongue-in-cheek look at fear in the American media. ♦

They are Skip Hollandsworth '79, an executive editor at *Texas Monthly* and one of the state's best-known writers; Russell Hurst '52,

executive director of the Society of Professional Journalists for a record 19 years; Camille Keith '67, an original employee of Southwest Airlines who has risen through the ranks to become vice president of special marketing; and Jerre Todd '57, a former *Fort Worth Press* sportswriter and area public relations executive for four decades. ♦
