## Board of Trustees sets tuition for 2007-2008 academic year DURING THEIR FALL BOARD MEETING FRIDAY,

DURING THEIR FALL BOARD MEETING FRIDAY, TCU'S Board of Trustees voted to increase tuition for the 2007-08 academic year by eight percent. New and returning full-time undergraduate students taking between 12 - 18 hours will pay a combined tuition and fees of \$24,820 from the current \$22,980. Even with the increase, TCU's tuition remains an excellent value among private universities across the country.

"TCU is a world-class, values-centered university," said Chancellor Victor J. Boschini Jr. "Those qualities are readily reflected in the distinctive research conducted by faculty and students, as well as the complex societal problems they regularly solve. And while increasing tuition is never easy, we cannot abandon our commitment to impart an unrivaled educational experience."

The Board also agreed to increase financial aid by eight percent. By the end of this year, TCU will have administered more than \$127 million in financial aid, with approximately \$63 million awarded from various grant and scholarship programs, and another \$64 million from educational loan sources.

Over the past few years, TCU has invested in both its academic programs and physical campus. The University appointed 40 new faculty positions in the past three years, and plans to add more. Additionally, TCU has invested some \$200 million in new and upgraded facilities.

In other news, the board also approved a twoyear residential requirement for all freshmen and sophomores, which will be fully implemented once construction on the new residential halls is complete. The students must live in universityowned or university-authorized housing.

"Studies show that students who live on campus receive a much richer educational experience than those who live off campus," said **Dr. Don Mills**, vice chancellor for student affairs. "Until 1980, virtually all underclassmen and a majority of upperclassmen lived on campus, but the healthy demand for on-campus living outstripped our residential space. Implementing this requirement will help TCU recommit to its residential heritage and align the University with other major private institutions with on-campus housing requirements."

The next trustee meeting is scheduled for February 2007. ◆

A nationally recognized authority on community health nursing, Dr. Lancaster, in collaboration with various colleagues, has published more than 50 articles in a variety of professional journals and given more than 200 speeches and workshops throughout the United States and internationally. Her UVA tenure has been distinguished by her innovative efforts to improve gender imbalance at the university to give women a more equal role in decision-making, by new alliances forged within the UVA Health System, and by leading the School of Nursing to greater national prominence.

### Hollywood cinematographer and alum Blake T. Evans to meet with students Tuesday

BLAKE T. EVANS, A 1986 RTVF GRADUATE of TCU, will spend all day tommorow back on campus, meeting with students and faculty from the College of Fine Arts and the College of Communication to discuss the business of film. In addition to his body of work as a Hollywood cinematographer, Evans is also author of the screenplay of Flyboys, now a major motion picture playing in theaters nationwide.

He is scheduled for a morning meeting with Jennifer Engler's advanced acting class, lunch with theatre faculty, and presentations to loel Timmer's business of media class, Greg Mansur's cinematography class and a cinematography lighting workshop. There will also be a Q&A with students in the late afternoon and a screening of clips from Evans films.

A native of Enid, OK, Evans headed for the West Coast after his TCU graduation with aspirations to become a director of photography for film. Early on, he found work helping with student films and producing behind-the-scenes video pieces and received
