CONNIE GUTTERSEN, AUTHOR OF *THE NEW York Times* best-selling book *The Sonoma Diet*, will be speaking on "Flavor is a Health Issue: Inspirations from *The Sonoma Diet*" as the department of nutritional sciences Green Honors Chair on Monday, Feb. 5, from 7 - 8 p.m. The lecture and book signing, which are free and open to the public, will be held in Sid Richardson Lecture Hall 1. Dr. Guttersen is a leading expert on the health benefits of diets inspired by Mediterranean, Latin American, and Asian cuisines. As a registered dietitian and nutrition instructor at the world-famous Culinary Institute of America-Greystone, Dr. Guttersen has spent her career focusing on the development of flavorful and nutritious approaches to healthy eating and weight reduction. Dr. Guttersen, who earned her B.S. in dietetics from TCU, returned to serve as an instructor in the Department of Nutritional Sciences at TCU from 1991-1993. She has also been a guest lecturer at international food and dietary conferences around the globe.

Extended Ed receives grant to launch TCU YOUTH program

THE OFFICE OF EXTENDED EDUCATION HAS been awarded a \$750,000 federal grant to partner with local non-profit organizations in the TCU YOUTH Program.

The program, designed by the Faith and Life Program at TCU, aims to address the needs of area youth ages 12 to 21, focusing on gang involvement, violence and child abuse and neglect. Plans to develop youth skills during the three-year grant include a summer student internship program, a speaker's bureau and service opportunities.

"Our overall objective is to strengthen community non-profit and faith-based organizations who serve youth so that we can help our community address issues and open the door to new venues for research," Judy Shannon,

As one of 100 national recipients of the grant, TCUYOUTH brings a new depth of programming to the Tarrant County area. Leadership training for volunteers and staff of the program will allow targeted assistance to each of the participating non-profit organizations.

Community partners include the Trinity Brazos Area of the Christian Church, Volunteer Center of North Texas, Tarrant County Youth Collaboration, H.O.P.E. Tutoring and HOPE Farms, Inc. Initial developments in the program will involve a needs assessment of community youth issues to determine the most critical needs for these partners.

The program carries the banner "Youth Organizations Unite, TCU Helps." According to Judy, the concept centers on community and family, consistent with the TCU vision of "accelerating our connectedness with the greater community, Fort Worth and the world."

The YOUTH Program Alliance, consisting of representatives from each partner organization,

community and local government leaders and youth representatives, will meet quarterly to coordinate responses to specific community needs.

"We hope that in this process we will identify and establish valuable development courses and consultants who can continue to strengthen non-profits for many years after the completion of the three-year grant," Judy said. ◆

Dr. Schwartz has written four textbooks on the psychology of learning and learning and memory as well as books for popular audiences. The most recent of those is titled The Paradox of Choice: Why More Is Less. His articles have appeared in Scientific American, Parade magazine, Chronicle of Higher Education, The New York Times, The London Times, New Republic and Slate.

He is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of New York University and received his master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Pennsylvania. He joined the faculty of Swarthmore in 1971. ◆

TCU celebrating next campus construction with indoor "groundbreaking"

STUDENTS WILL HAVE A SYMBOLIC "groundbreaking" for the new Brown-Lupton Student Union, at noon Friday in the current Student Center lobby. There will be dirt to dig, along with shovels wielded by Chancellor Victor J. Boschini Jr., Larry Markley (Student Center director), SuperFrog and four SGA representatives, as well as a representative from Linbeck Construction.

A free chili lunch for students will be served upstairs in the Ballroom, and T-shirts will be given away to students.

The estimated \$45.7 million facility, due for completion in August 2008, will contain 145,700 square feet. In addition to dining facilities and meeting rooms, the Student Union will contain the post office, copy center, convenience store, gift shop and a 350-seat theater for performances, lectures and movies. The most prominent building element is a 130-foot bell tower that will become a landmark for the new Campus Commons.
