School of Music begins real time lessons on Internet2 with **London connection Feb. 7**

A NEW DAY FOR COLLEGE-LEVEL MUSIC instruction in North Texas dawns Wednesday, Feb. 7, when two TCU School of Music students sit down at the Steinway for a masterclass with a renowned piano teacher in London, Meanwhile, Christopher Elton, head of keyboard studies at the Royal Academy of Music there, will have two of his students receiving instruction from José Feghali of the TCU piano faculty and gold medalist at the 1985 Van Cliburn International Piano Competition. It's the future of teaching and performance, made possible through advanced Internet2 technology - an ultra fast, very high bandwidth, virtually instantaneous Internet connection currently only available at selected educational institutions and research organizations.

Members of the campus community are invited to drop by for a while and watch it happen. The two-plus hour session, due to begin at 9 a.m. in PepsiCo Recital Hall on campus, is only the first of many opportunities that are just around the corner. Through the use of high resolution video cameras, audio quality that's even better than CD and a nearly nonexistent time-lag between locations, Internet2 connections literally open up a whole new world of possibilities.

Last year, the University began to experiment with a live streaming video Webcast of the TCU Latin American Music Festival, and both Webcasting and Internet2 broadcasting of Adam Golka's recitals of the 32 Beethoven Sonatas. Further research and fine-tuning of the technology are now making the rest possible.

Later this spring, a TCU percussion major has an appointment to audition for the Royal Academy in real time, with the London faculty able to interact appropriately. The savings in time and travel expenses alone will be a tremendous benefit in a young artist's life.

Veda Kaplinsky, TCU piano faculty member and head of piano at The Juilliard School in New York City, will teach private lessons and masterclasses to TCU students using the same technology.

Families of students who play in campus music ensembles will be able to watch (their) selected performances live on the Web from their home computers, even if they live across the country or half-way around the world.

"Our reach at the School of Music is both national and international. Offering parents and friends of our students a remote 'virtual'

Volunteers needed for study

THE KINESIOLOGY DEPARTMENT IS SEEKING volunteers for a 12-week health study. The research study involves the investigation of exercise on markers of obesity and obesityrelated diseases found in the blood and fat tissue of post-menopausal women. Women between the ages of 60 and 70 years, who are not currently taking hormone replacement therapy, believe they should loose 20 pounds or more, and who have not engaged in a structured exercise program for the previous six months, are encouraged to volunteer.

During the 12-week study, participants will meet at the TCU Recreation Center three days a week and complete a program of 10 weight lifting exercises or meet two days a week for instruction in weight lifting techniques and principles. All volunteers will receive complimentary access to the TCU Recreation Center for three months for their participation.

Before the study begins, volunteers will undergo a medical exam with a study physician, including a treadmill stress test with continuous heart monitoring with an electrocardiogram. Volunteers will also complete an oral glucose tolerance test before and after the three-month study period to determine their insulin and blood sugar responses.
