Leo Munson will receive this year's Michael R. Ferrari Award at Dec. 15 Commencement

CHANCELLOR VICTOR J. BOSCHINI JR. HAS chosen Leo W. Munson (Associate Provost for Academic Support) as recipient of the Michael R. Ferrari Award for Distinguished University Service and Leadership. The honor is announced annually during Fall Commencement.

This is only the third year the Ferrari Award has been presented.

It was established in Chancellor Ferrari's name to recognize a faculty or staff member for leadership in finding a solution to a significant problem, managing an important project, designing a creative new initiative, or reaching out to improve the University or surrounding community. Previous winners are José Feghali (School of Music) and Ed McNertney (economics).

Leo was nominated by **Jan Fox**, coordinator of Research & Sponsored Projects, for leading and guiding the VIA Initiative. He very thoughtfully gathered a team of reviewers and sought their input to determine the most appropriate manner to move forward with the program. He spent countless hours designing the application and the call for proposals, then was actively involved in the review process including onsight visits to project locations to determine if outcomes would be achievable. He continues to be closely involved with directors of VIA-funded projects.

The student mentoring which Leo also consistently provides enhances the performance of his unit. He makes time for any and all TCU students experiencing problems, listens patiently and doesn't stop until their problem is solved. A testament to his committed support is the number of young adults who stop by the campus to visit Leo, even after they've graduated.

Commencement is set for 1 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 15 in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum. Guest speaker will be Gordon England, the 29th Deputy Secretary of Defense. He previously served as Secretary of the Navy and as the first Deputy Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security.

Prior to joining the administration of Pres. George W. Bush, he was president of General Dynamics (later Lockheed) here. His business career has spanned more than 40 years as an engineer and senior executive. A native of Baltimore, England graduated from the University of Maryland with a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering and earned his M.B.A. degree from the Neeley School in 1975.

Appproximately 846 students are candidates for graduation, including four with a 4.0 GPA. About 112 are eligible to graduate with Latin Honors. There are 11 double degree candidates and one triple degree candidate.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THIS YEAR'S UNITED Way campus campaign total \$136,924.72 in pledges from 720 donors. And donations are continuing to trickle in, according to Nancy Styles (marketing and communication), campaign coordinator. The total is approximately 19% over the announced \$115,000 goal, with an almost 4% increase in the number of donors.

"Each and every one of you deserves a pat on the back and a special thank you," says Mike Scott, Chancellor's executive leadership intern and the University's United Way Campaign chair. "We are all asked to do so much, yet we always seem to come through when help is needed.
