Schieffer School to co-sponsor programs with D.C. think tank

THE SCHIEFFER SCHOOL AND THE CENTER for Strategic and International Studies in Washington, D.C., have announced a new series of dialogues with journalists and public policy experts to be held in the nation's capital.

The series, Dialogues in Public Policy and the Media, will be jointly sponsored by the Schieffer School and CSIS and will be hosted by Bob Schieffer. The programs will be held at CSIS headquarters at 1800 K Street NW in Washington. The first event will be at 5 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 27 to discuss the current situation in Afghanistan.

Participants will be Lt. Gen. David Barno (US Army, ret.), R. Nicholas Burns (Undersecretary of State for Political Affairs), Steve Coll (CEO, New America Foundation and staff writer for the New Yorker) and Rick Barton (co-director, Post Conflict Reconstruction Project).

"This is a great opportunity for the Schieffer School, since CSIS is one of the most respected institutions of its kind in the world," said Schieffer. "Their resident fellows and associates are called upon by every major news organization every day to provide insight into the complex issues facing the world."

CSIS is an independent, bipartisan public policy institute that provides strategic insights and policy solutions for decision makers in government, international institutions, the private sector and civil society.

Changes in London study abroad in line with Spain, Italy programs

CENTER FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDIES: TCU Abroad has redefined its fall and spring semester program in London to provide students a broader collection of courses and opportunities to interact with international students and better align it with TCU programs located in Spain and Italy.

The TCU in London program will partner with the University of Westminster, which is home to 4,000 international students from 160 countries. In addition to living on the Westminster campus, TCU students can enroll in a wide variety of courses such as the humanities and social sciences, natural sciences, business, computer science and the fine arts. Westminster professors will teach the classes.

"The new vision for TCU in London embraces important academic features of study abroad including TCU students taking course work with other international students and living on a university campus," said Jane Kucko, director

Watch this week's lunar edipse through on-campus telescopes

TCU IS HOSTING A PUBLIC LECTURE AND lunar eclipse-watching event on campus Wednesday. The lecture by Doug Ingram (physics & astronomy) will begin in Sid Richardson Lecture Hall 2 at 7 p.m.

Guests may then begin viewing the eclipse through telescopes and binoculars in the plaza outside Mary Couts Burnett Library at 8 p.m. The moon will begin to darken then and will be completely eclipsed by 9 p.m. The total eclipse will last until approximately 9:45 p.m.

Viewers can expect to see Mars and Saturn, as well as the star Regulus (which is the heart of the constellation Leo), and the constellations of the Winter Circle. This event is free and open to the public.

In case of inclement weather, guests may attend a second lecture in Sid Richardson LH 2 from 8 - 10 p.m. with a narrated slide show about the objects and constellations currently in the sky. 🔶

THE SOCIETY OF BIBLICAL LITERATURE IS partnering with Brite Divinity School and the TCU Religion Department in a two-day event Feb. 22-23 that will bring biblical and theological scholarship in dialogue with the on-the-ground pastoral work around the prison and justice systems in Texas. All events are in Weatherly Hall at Brite and are free and open to the public.

At 7 p.m. Friday, author Virginia Stem Owens, a longtime resident of Huntsville, will discuss the complex and painful ways the justice system affects those who live within and without the prison walls. She and her husband, David, wrote Living Next Door to the Death House.
