Marketing & Communication makes staff changes to support initiatives in D.C.

HIGHER EDUCATION IS FACING IMPORTANT legislative, societal, and international issues, and TCU is playing a strong role in championing its causes.

Recently Chancellor **Victor J. Boschini, Jr.** became chair of the board of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities (NAICU), a Washington-based lobbyist for America's private colleges and universities. And at the request of the Chancellor, **Larry Lauer**, vice chancellor for marketing & communication, will focus his full attention on developing national presence and visibility for TCU, and building key international relationships abroad.

Currently, Larry is working with NAICU to support the Chancellor's role on legislative issues; the American Council on Education (ACE) on both legislative issues and a major initiative to communicate the greater good contributions of higher education to the American public; the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) to develop international institutional relationships; and on partnerships between the TCU Schieffer School of Journalism, the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) (one of Washington's most respected international public policy think tanks) and The Washington Center for Internships and Academic Seminars.

In order to support these new national and international initiatives, **Tracy Syler-Jones** (associate vice chancellor for marketing & communication) will become associate vice chancellor and executive director of marketing & communication. Tracy will assume responsibility for all day-to-day tactical planning and implementation of

TCU's marketing and communication initiatives, and coordinate the work of the marketing & communication staff. Both Larry and Tracy will continue to serve on the Chancellor's cabinet.

Shawn Kornegay will become associate director of communication and will take on more day-to-day media relations work and additional duties with schools and colleges. **Lisa Albert** will become assistant director of communication and expand some of her current duties.

Additionally, a Web site development position will be filled to enhance the video and new media capabilities of the operation. ♦

Volunteers needed for this year's "Trash to Treasure" dorm clean-out

FACULTY AND STAFF WITH TRUCKS, SUVS or time to help are asked to volunteer for this year's "TCU Trash to Treasure" event, which collects items left behind by students during residence hall move-out and distributes them to community beneficiaries. The entire donation drive is faculty/staff driven and will not be successful without your support.

Last year's amazing array of donations

included everything from books, food, and clothing to backpacks, alarm clocks, hairdryers and electronic devices.

Volunteers are needed between May 6 - 10 to transport donations from residence halls on main campus and Worth Hills to the collection site in Brachman Hall. Shifts last one to two hours and require teams of two to four people. Three teams are needed each day.

Another opportunity is available May 12-13 when teams will sort and prepare the items for distribution. To sign up to help, contact Terence Kennedy at t.l.kennedy@tcu.edu. Please indicate your availability during collection and sorting days and whether or not you have a truck or SUV that can be used to transport donations. This is also an opportunity for departments and offices to volunteer together, so feel free to form your own team. If you do not sign up as a team, you will be assigned to one.

Community agencies who will receive this year's "Trash to Treasure" donations include:

- Communities in Schools - a stay-in-school program sponsored by the Texas Legislature. It uses a case management technique to prevent dropouts, help students stay in school, successfully learn and prepare for life.

- Tarrant Area Food Bank - an agency which works to eliminate hunger in our city and 13 surrounding counties by providing food, education and other resources.

- Books for Africa - a program that collects, sorts, ships and distributes books to children in Africa and works to end the book famine in Africa.

- Samaritan House - a nonprofit agency that provides housing, medical treatment and life skills training for homeless people with HIV.

- SafeHaven of Tarrant county - a nonprofit organization that exists to end family violence through safety, support, prevention and social change. ♦

TRIO program seeks mentors for McNair Program in fall

THE TCU MCNAIR PROGRAM, A PART OF THE TRIO program in the College of Education, is seeking mentor volunteers for fall 2008. Faculty and staff are needed as volunteers to conduct and guide students through a structured research project.

The McNair Program at TCU is a federally funded program designed to identify college juniors and seniors who possess the academic skills, motivation and desire to continue their studies at the doctoral level.

The mentor's role is to serve as a role model, provide research guidance, encouragement, and increase immersion in the academic culture. It bridges the academic and social gaps among peers, faculty and scholars. Through shared academic and social activities, bonding occurs between the McNair scholars and mentors. Faculty mentors provide exposure and insight essential for the participant to understand the skills necessary to become successful in the academic world.

Through the mentoring program, the McNair scholar's self-perception, levels of personal and academic expectations and likelihood of success are increased. The program consists of a continuous supportive relationship between the scholar and his/her mentor. McNair scholars are encouraged to continue contact with their mentors after graduating from TCU.

RTVF creates TV pilot as this year's collaboration

TCU STUDENTS FROM VARIOUS CLASSES within the RTVF department are collaborating to create, manage and produce a television pilot titled *Fork in the Road*. This is the first time that students have created a television pilot.

"The quality of the show was outstanding, and as in the past the experience, gives the students as close to a real-world experience as can be replicated in an educational environment," said **Chuck LaMendola**, an instructor of RTVF and director of the project.

The project is a collaboration of several classes in the department including producing, dramatic writing, entertainment law and finance, audio I and video II. Students participate in every step of the process from the extensive writing process and constructing sets to casting and drafting contracts. *Fork in the Road* is truly a student creation.

Fork in the Road is the story of Audrey Sinclair; a young woman assigned the task of determining if a dysfunctional country diner in the town of Guthrie has the potential to become a national chain.
