# Graduating class of nearly 1,400 due to walk in two ceremonies Saturday

AS OF PRESS TIME, 1,371 STUDENTS ARE expected to graduate during Saturday's split Commencement ceremonies, set for 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum.

Of that number of degree candidates, 1,053 will receive bachelor's degrees (16 will receive double degrees), 277 will receive master's degrees and 10 are Ph.D. candidates. The morning total is 707, while the number graduating in the afternoon

Brite Divinity School has 31 graduates (three Ph.D. candidates, and the rest receiving master's degrees).

There are 384 students set to graduate with Latin Honors, including 16 with a 4.0 GPA (one of which is also a double degree recipient). For only the second time, TCU will also be awarding three degrees to one student in a single day.

There are 34 international students graduating, representing 32 foreign

#### Theme of fall semester to be "Think Purple, Live Green"

TCU IS OFFERING STUDENTS, FACULTY, STAFF and the community an opportunity to get engaged in sustainability this fall through the University's 2008 Sustainability Theme Semester. The "Think Purple, Live Green" semester will consist of presentations by well-known personalities in sustainability, special classes, symposia and workshops discussing how to make human economic systems last longer and have less impact on ecological systems.

"The primary goal of the theme semester is to encourage members of the TCU community to participate in sustainable activities and learn how they can lower their carbon footprint," said Keith Whitworth, professor of sociology and longtime environmental activist, who will be organizing the semester along with Barbara Brown Herman (associate vice chancellor for student affairs and dean of student development).

Barbara also coordinated the 2004 theme semester "Politics and Principles" and the 2007 theme semester "Rights. Responsibilities. Respect." According to Barbara, "The Sustainability semester will engage individuals in a broad discussion about the role of sustainable actions in society and the values that those actions create.

Faculty and staff may volunteer to be part of a "Froggle," which is a way to get involved with the efforts of the theme semester without having to be part of a committee. Leaders will identify tasks that are needed and individuals can volunteer for tasks that fit his or her time commitment ability. •

#### Free hearing screenings May 20

MAY IS NATIONAL BETTER HEARING AND Speech Month. To recognize that, and to encourage people to incorporate hearing tests into their annual health check-ups, Miller Speech and Hearing Clinic is offering free hearing screenings on a reservation basis Tuesday, May 20 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. RSVP to ext. 7620.

The 30-minute screenings, available to adults and children ages four and older, consist of a 15-minute preliminary evaluation to determine hearing loss and a 15-minute counseling session to explain test results. Screenings will be conducted by TCU graduate students, supervised by ASHA-certified (American Speech Language Hearing Association) audiologists.

"Hearing loss affects one out of every four persons over the age of 60 and increases to one out of three over age 70," said **Helen Morrison** (associate professor, COSID).

"With noise exposure (video games, stereos), noise-related hearing loss is appearing as early as school age. Even minimal loss has been demonstrated to affect language development and school performance," she adds.

TCU has offered the free hearing clinic for the past 17 years. Last year, 25 percent of the participants exhibited some sort of hearing problem.

# Nurse Anesthesia grads achieve unanimous pass rate

TCU'S NURSE ANESTHESIA PROGRAM IS beaming with pride after 100 percent of the December 2007 graduating class passed their certification exams on the first try, which exceeds the national average by seven percent.

"Our students receive a quality experience both academically and clinically," Kay Sanders, director of the School of Nurse Anesthesia explained. "It also means that our selection standards are appropriate, and that our program produces competent beginning-level CRNAs (Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists)."

Fifty-five students took and passed the National Certification Examination given by the Council on Certification of Nurse Anesthetists after graduating from the 28-month program, which is a requirement in order to become a CRNA.

Currently, all of the students are working both locally and across the nation in states including Oklahoma, California, Louisiana and North Carolina. ◆

Over 107 school district representatives from 38 North Texas districts came to TCU for the College of Education's recent annual "Metroplex Interview Day," making this year the largest turnout in the event's history. The school district representatives interviewed 100 TCU education students, including 10 alumni members, to potentially hire them for teaching positions in their districts.

"This was a very successful event," said **Dale Young**, director of College of Education's Student Teaching and Career Services. "We had more district representatives than students. One hundred percent of the students will get job offers, with an average starting pay of \$44,920."

The Metroplex Interview Day offered the opportunity for students and alumni to interview up to 20 times during the event, with each interview lasting for 28 minutes. A ringing bell

indicated the end of the interview, at which time the students/alumni rotated to the next district's table.

When asked why so many districts participated in the event, Young responded, "The districts think TCU's education students are very well-informed, the best prepared first-year students and the most well-rounded."

"The districts also like how well-organized the event is and they appreciate actually getting to interview the students," said Young.
