Trinity Shakespeare Festival will debut in TCU Theatre Dept. summer of 2009

THE TCU THEATRE DEPARTMENT HAS announced the June 2009 inaugural season of the Trinity Shakespeare Festival on campus. "The mission of the Trinity Shakespeare Festival is to bring a professional summer Shakespeare company back to Tarrant County after a long absence," said **T. J. Walsh (theatre)**, artistic director of the Festival. "We are very excited about starting this new tradition and our hope is that the Trinity Shakespeare Festival will become an integral part of the community during the summer and that eventually it becomes as much a part of the summer in North Texas as the Rangers and the guarantee of sultry days," he said.

The inaugural season will consist of Shakespeare's tragic romance, *Romeo and Juliet*, and his delightful comedy, *Twelfth Night*, playing during the month of June. "The plays will run in repertory," explained Walsh. "For example, on a Wednesday night, Friday night or Saturday matinee, you can see the company perform *Romeo and Juliet* and on a subsequent Thursday night, Saturday night or Sunday matinee, you'll see the same actors perform in *Twelfth Night*. This is true repertory theater in the Elizabethan tradition and is both challenging and exciting to the actors and artists involved and a joy for audiences to see the versatility of their favorite performers from one show to the next."

The cast will be professional Equity actors in collaboration with TCU student intern actors, to form a professional summer repertory company. Ticket prices will be in the \$20 range.

Harry Parker (chair, theatre) will act as managing director. "We will use both our 200 seat theaters on campus for the repertory," he said. "That way audiences will be able to enjoy both a traditional Elizabethan thrust stage in the Hays Theatre and the proscenium-style Buschman Theatre in Ed Landreth Hall. Both are air-conditioned and, in the heat of the Texas summer, we feel it will make enjoying Shakespeare that much more pleasant."

The new Festival is made possible by a *Vision In Action* grant from the University, which will largely underwrite the Festival for the first two years, following which private funding will be sought. The Festival plans to have occasional pre-show meals available in the new Brown-Lupton University Union, and traditional outdoor pre-show and after-show events to take advantage of the warm nights of June on the grounds of TCU.

A minor in healthy aging is available fall semester 2008

TO HELP ADDRESS THE NEEDS OF THE GROWING aging population, TCU has developed an interdisciplinary minor in healthy aging, through the Center for Healthy Aging. The coursework will prepare graduates to better understand the older adult population by challenging misconceptions and stereotypes.

"The collision of an inadequate workforce and a rapidly expanding older adult population demands that our graduates be better equipped to work with and for older adults and their families, their communities and their workplaces," says **Linda Curry**, director of TCU's Center for Healthy Aging.

Texas has the fourth largest older adult population in the United States and over 2.5 million Texans are age 60 or older. An estimated 66 percent are younger than 75 and approximately 50 percent of older Texans reside in three major areas of the state; the D/FW Metroplex, San

Antonio area and the Houston-Galveston region. By 2040, the percent of older Texans is projected to increase by 193 percent, bringing the aging population to 23 percent of the total Texas population.

Through the Healthy Aging Minor, students will cultivate their knowledge of healthy aging and the continuing contribution of adults in our society as they age; understand the diversity and complexity of the older adult population; create and provide products, services, and programs responsive to the wants and needs of the growing population of older adults; help organizations to recognize and value older adults as resources as well as clients; and examine the difficult decisions that they may face when older family members become vulnerable.

EXTENDED EDUCATION HAS EXPANDED ITS offerings of unique courses through strategic partnerships with community organizations, local museums and churches, and TCU faculty and alumni. The new fall catalog is now available in print and online at www.lifelong.tcu.edu.

Among the creative courses are "Travel the World with TCU," offering four individually sponsored trips including Spain, Italy, Greece and Austria; numerous educational programs through the Botanical Research Institute of Texas (BRIT); a historic opportunity featuring a documentary film and discussion on "The Real Story of Charlie Wilson" followed the next day by the Jim Wright Symposium featuring Charlie Wilson as the speaker; an educational course "Electing a President 2008: Are We There Yet?" by the Center for Texas Studies; and "Old World Wines vs. New World Wines" examining different European winemaking styles. Other notable courses include "The Barnett Shale: Facts, Myths and Opportunities" and a non-credit pharmacy technician course.

Extended Ed also will offer its traditional courses. ♦
