Rich Enos and Denise Bennett win top honors at Convocation

DR. RICHARD LEO ENOS WAS NAMED recipient of the 2008 Chancellor's Award for Distinguished Achievement as a Creative Teacher and Scholar during Fall Convocation Sept. 9 in Ed Landreth Auditorium. He has been professor and holder of the Lillian Radford Chair of Rhetoric and Composition in the TCU English Dept. since 1995, although he has been a teacher for 35 years. Chancellor Victor J. Boschini, Jr. made the presentation which comes with a \$20,000

Rich Enos has compiled an impressive record of scholarly achievement while teaching both graduate and undergraduate courses and providing extraordinary service to TCU. As a colleague observes, his teaching, advising and mentoring practices are "models for us all." Hehas produced 13 books and annuals; 83 articles, chapters and monographs; 61 papers presented at professional meetings; memberships on 17 editorial boards; and directed more than 21 TCU dissertations.

Epitomizing the true teacher-scholar, Rich notes: "If we are committed to our vocation, we wish to both learn and share that learning with others."

"Every time a student has done poorly, I feel that I have done poorly as a teacher," he explains. "It bothers me that I failed to find a way to connect with this student. I feel best when my former students correspond with me and thank me for helping them see what they are capable of achieving.

Denise Bennett, academic program specialist for the Pre-Health Professions, received the Wassenich Award for Mentoring in the TCU Community. A check for \$3,000 goes with the recognition. Denise joined the TCU staff seven years ago to work on the administrative part of assessment for the SACS reaccreditation process. With that completed, she moved into her current position in 2003.

Students and alumni of the pre-health/premed program cite Denise as being their own personal cheerleader all during the challenging coursework, studying for the MCAT and the wait for acceptance into med school - always delivering the warmest hugs and the wisest advice along the way.

"The amazing group of students TCU graduates into medical programs make it easy to come to work every day," Denise says. "I cherish their friendship and am so excited to cheer on their

ED picks TCU as location for dialogue on new Higher **Education Opportunity Act**

THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED) HAS selected TCU as the site of the first public meeting to discuss the recently enacted Higher Education Opportunity Act (Public Law 110-315). The meeting, which is free and open to the public, will be Friday, Sept. 19 from 9 a.m. to .4 p.m. in the University Union ballroom.

"We are honored to host the first meeting on this important and complex legislation," said Chancellor Victor J. Boschini, Jr. "Federal student aid is vitally important to all colleges and universities and we are no exception."

By law, before the new law takes effect, the ED must conduct a series of public meetings to discuss the issues and concerns of students, families and institutions. At TCU, three ED officials will listen to individuals' questions or comments on issues related to the implementation of the legislation. Those wishing to address the panel must sign up to

speak on the day of the event. Sign-ups begin at 8 a.m. just outside the Union ballroom. Speakers will be called upon to address the panel in numerical order.

The Higher Education Opportunity Act of 2008 extends and enhances the Higher Education Act, the federal law that provides student grants and loans to students and families. Approval of this more than 1,150page bill took five years and contains many new reporting and regulatory requirements that colleges must adhere to regarding tuition and textbook costs, accreditation, and student financial aid.

A large number of educators representing all types of colleges and universities are expected to participate in the meeting. Chancellor Boschini will encourage the education agency to ensure that benefits are delivered to students and families with a minimum of regulatory burden.

Other site locations for the ED meetings are Pepperdine University, the University of Rhode

The three are the top higher education experts on this new legislation and have extensively analyzed the legislation in an effort to help colleges and universities better comprehend the complexities of the new bill.

Study Abroad Fair Sept. 24 offers a chance to apply for or renew a U.S. passport

THE CENTER FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDIES: TCU Abroad will host a Study Abroad Fair from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 24 in the new University Union auditorium. In addition to providing details on TCU's various programs abroad, the U.S. Postal Service will be on hand to offer passport services to students, faculty and staff.

To apply for or renew a passport, applicants should bring with them: proof of citizenship (certified birth certificate, previous passport or naturalization certificate), a current driver's license or state ID card, and two identical 2x2" photos. Photos may also be purchased onsite for \$15.

All applicants must appear in person, including

Passport fees (\$75 for adults and \$60 for children under 16) are payable to the Dept. of State by check or money order. An additional \$25 execution fee is payable to the Postmaster by check, money order, cash or credit/debit card.
