## TCU artwork on display at new Daimler office complex

DAIMLER FINANCIAL SERVICES AND THE ART departments of TCU and SMU are collaborating to create an ongoing, annual exhibition series called "Experiencing Perspectives."

The exhibition is displayed in the company's newest location in Fort Worth. This contemporary, 164,000-square-footfacility, with capacity for 800 employees, is the newest addition to the Alliance commercial development along Interstate 1-

The company has launched a partnership with the art schools of TCU and SMU, the first and only initiative of its kind that joins established and up-and-coming artists from both Fort Worth and Dallas in a non-traditional exhibition approach. The show features the work of students, faculty and graduates of these two highly-acclaimed fine art programs.

Since the new facility opened in September, the installation of more than 80 pieces of art representing over 40 artists is now being experienced by approximately 550 employees as well as numerous visitors on a daily basis.

Daimler Financial Services has a similar partnership with Cranbrook Academy of Art in Metro Detroit where graduate students' art has been displayed for the past seven years on a 12-month rotating basis in the company's headquarters in Farmington Hills, Mich.

Klaus Entenmann, president and CEO of Daimler Financial Services in the Americas, said employees are excited by the creative experience in their new environment.

art," Entenmann said. "In bringing this art to our employees, it represents our commitment to a creative approach to our business and to serving our dealers and our customers."

Ron Watson (chair, art & art history) said this is an important benefit to art students in learning what it takes to place work in a corporate environment. "We are gratified that the company has an enlightened outlook," he said. "This is a terrific step forward for our students, because their work will be exhibited in a public environment. It's a perfect union for us."

"Students typically think about exhibiting their work in a gallery, which I think of as a neutral site," said Jay Sullivan, chair, Division of Art at SMU. "But now with this relationship, they will get feedback on their work from a wide-ranging audience. They will think about the presentation and meaning of their work more personally." •

On days when the University is officially closed because of bad weather conditions, all students, faculty and staff members will be excused from reporting, except for those employees providing essential services related to (1) health and safety, (2) the presence of a residential student community and (3) agreements with the public for the use of University facilities.

The decision to close the University will be made by 6:30 a.m. on the day in question and will be sent to campus via TCU ALERT, a campuswide e-mail and posted on the TCU homepage as soon as possible. Closure information will also be recorded on 817-257-4636 and relayed to local media.

(Weather from Page 1) should check one of the internal sources (text message from TCU ALERT, Web, recorded phone information, e-mail) first rather than relying only on radio and television announcements.

Although all Metroplex radio stations and television channels 4, 5, 8, 11 and 23 will have received the information, the volume of weather-generated news they must deal with could delay updates of TCU's situation.

Remember, TCU will only use TCU ALERT during major emergencies or weatherrelated campus closures. If you have not yet added your cellphone number to your personal contact information or have changed cellphone numbers since last year, go to my.tcu.edu to update. •

## **TCU percussion students in** the spotlight at international convention in Austin Nov. 7 - 8

AFTER AMID-WEEK PERFORMANCE TOUR in the Austin area, TCU School of Music students will take a star turn at the 33rd annual Percussive Arts Society International Convention over the weekend. The TCU Percussion Ensemble, under the direction of Brian West, is one of only three college groups selected to perform there in a worldwide competition held earlier this year.
