





INTERSECTIONAL INITIATION

From Fort Worth, Texas, come the Horned Frogs of Texas Christian, all hopped up to give the Fordham Ram a nice case of warts. The Frogs may do the job, too, if their performances of the past are any indication. Ohio State trimmed the Frogs, but it was raining in Columbus, Ohio, on September twenty-fifth, and the Frogs didn't like that rain. Davey O'Brien, who is hurling the T. C. U. passes in Sam Baugh's old post, likes a dry field for the ends and backs to run down to the secondary for his spot aerials.

Dave is quite a football man. He will play sixty minutes, if Coach Meyer lets him. In the pre-season prognostications anent the Southwest Conference, Arkansas and the Texas Aggies were favored. Texas Christian recovered from the Ohio State opener to tie both those favorites, 7-7, and trim the Tulsa Hurricane, 20-13. In these three games, Dave O'Brien was the key man in the Frogs' attack. He passed and ran and blocked and tackled and there was nothing much Arkansas, Tulsa and the Texas Aggies could do about him.

Earl Walsh, Fordham's flying scout and backfield coach, used to have an idea he was air-minded after several years of airplane travel to the Pacific coast and the southwest to scout opponents of the Maroon, but he confesses that watching Dave O'Brien pitch forward passes has given him a new and true concept of what air progress really is. Earl's opinions are not unthinkingly given and we must abide by what he says about the rest of the Horned Frogs as well as Dave O'Brien.

It seems that from tackle to tackle, T. C. U. is not a line to be scored through. I. B. Hale, the left-tackle, shrinks away to a mere 235 pounds. Allie White, the right tackle, might just as well be known as I. B. Hearty, for he weighs two hundred pounds. The left guard is Captain Mason Mayne, and linemen about the country don't come any better than Mason. At the risk of incurring the reader's wrath, we will even venture that Mason is the Maynestay of the Texas Christian line. Glenn Rogers is the other guard, and Don Looney and Durwood Horner are the ends. At least, these men were in the starting lineup against the Texas Aggies last week.

Pat Clifford and John Hall, the halfbacks, are damaging runners and capable pass receivers for T. C. U. Linnon Blackmon, the fullback, is good at gaining close-order yardage. Ward Wilkinson, who plays in the number 2 back position when he is in the game, is one of football's best kickers. He booted two out of bounds within Tulsa's five-yard line. Ward will see action today, as will Lacy McClanahan, another crack bucking back.

We have purposely omitted mentioning Ki Aldrich, the T. C. U. center, until now. Ki is considered the best pivotman in the Southwest. He raised the dickens against the Texas A. & M. team. Ki brings to mind another center named Alexander Franklin Wojciechowicz. Wojie was guite a man against Pittsburgh here last week, but that was nothing new. He has been guite a man against every team he has faced for the last three years. If there has ever been a better center in the history of football, we should have enjoyed seeing him.

While we're on the subject, every man in Maroon, who played against Pitt, is deserving of much praise. Our particular favorite was Joe Bernard, the right guard, because Joe Bernard is a senior and he has never given up trying to make a fine football player out of himself since his freshman year, even though he failed to win a letter in sophomore and junior. Bernard played almost sixty minutes and he proved himself a fine football player against the best team in the country and now he can count on having a varsity F to go along with that 95 average in studies, that has kept him an honor student during his Fordham days.

"Devil Doll" Franco was his usual self in the game with the Panthers. Nothing more need be said about Edmund. Captain John Druze and Harry Jacunski were a great pair of ends and Don Bintz did a noble relief job. Mike Kochel remarked to Coach Frank Leahy after the game that he felt like playing another sixty minutes. What shape that Kochel is in! The Panthers thought that Al Babartsky was the toughest man on the field. Marshall Goldberg, whom Jim Crowley thought was the best Pitt man on the field, remarked that Babartsky was the toughest tackle in the world to block satisfactorily.

"Butch" Fortunato, Steve Kazlo, Dom Principe and Joe Granski did an amazing job in their first major varsity game as starters. They made mistakes, but what four inexperienced backs wouldn't, if tossed against those Pitt Panthers. Just for the fun of it, watch what Pitt does to the rest of the teams on its schedule. Fortunato did some able running and blocking, and his passing will improve. Not every team can rush a passer like those Panthers. Principe picked up some nice yardage on bucks, while Kazlo and Granski were alert players at all times.

We have also saved a nod for Joe Woitkoski. Joe not only got off the best kick of the day when the pressure was on; he likewise made the best tackle. Woitkoski is going to be of great value to this Fordham team. He was hitting like a triphammer on defense last Saturday, and he has the speed to be a good ball-carrier.

So here are two fine teams battling it out in the Polo Grounds, Texas Christian, co-favorites for the Southwest Conference championship, and Fordham, about as good as you'll find in any section. David and his slinging against the robust Ram. The Texas Christian Band jazzing it up and the Fordham Band holding its own. (Maybe that Fordham Band didn't hold its own last week!) Another big day as Fordham begins the intersectional phase of its 1937 schedule.

THE FIGHTING FROGS

The Horned Frogs of Texas Christian University (Fort Worth) make their "Broadway" debut today in the Polo Grounds.

The Frogs feature a group of small town boys playing big time football. They are a genuine Texas product, there being only one player on the squad whose home is not in Texas. He is from Oklahoma.

Head Coach Leo R. ("Dutch") Meyer, Line Coach Lester ("Mike") Brumbelow, Athletic Director Howard Grubbs, Business Manager L. C. Wright, Assistant Athletic Director Mack Clark—all are graduates of T. C. U. The entire athletic and coaching staff is thus "home grown."

Texas Christian has been playing football since 1896, when the school was located in Waco, Texas, and known as Add-Ran College.

However, it was not until along in the early 'teen years that football began to get serious attention. The Horned Frogs had small squads. On at least one occasion a game was played without a single substitution; and on several occasions the traveling squad was composed of no more than 14 or 15 players. But these teams won their share of the contests and "Little T. C. U." (there were perhaps 150 boys enrolled at that time) often bowled over their rivals from the larger schools. "Fighting Frogs" began to be a tradition in the Southwest.

In those days T. C. U. played as a member of the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Coach W. L. Driver turned out an undefeated and untied eleven in 1920, and on the strength of that record the school gained admission into the Southwest Conference in 1923.

Matty Bell, Centre College star who had attended high school in Fort Worth, returned home to coach the Frog warriors for their debut in the Southwest Conference. Bell, now at Southern Methodist, added much prestige to the Frogs' football reputation, but never quite managed to win a conference flag. A tie for second place in the 1925 standings was his best year.

Bell transferred to Texas A. & M. in 1929 and T. C. U. officials brought Francis Schmidt (then known in the Southwest as 'the Miracle Man'' of basketball) from the University of Arkansas as head coach. The 1929 eleven won the school's first conference championship, their undefeated record marred only by a tie with S. M. U.

That championship electrified T. C. U. and Fort Worth and the result was a new concrete horseshoe stadium as a home for the Frogs and a place in the national football sun. The one big moment before that had been the naming of Raymond (''Rags'') Matthews as an all-American end in 1927.

Since 1929 the Frogs have finished below third place in the Southwest Conference only once. They repeated for the championship in 1932 by doing what no other team had ever done up to that time—winning from all six of the other conference members.

When Coach Schmidt went to Ohio State, Leo R. ("Dutch") Meyer, who had joined the T. C. U. staff in 1923 as freshman coach, was stepped up to head coach.

Under Meyer the Horned Frogs have attained their greatest national fame, although they have not been able to capture the conference flag. In 1935 they dropped one game and lost both the conference championship and a Rose Bowl bid thereby. But they went on to win from Louisiana State in the Sugar Bowl game at New Orleans, to be ranked the No. 1 team of the nation by the Williamson Rating System.

Last year the Frogs had their bad moments, but they ranked second in the conference and again won high national honors by being the only team to knock over the strong Santa Clara Broncos and by winning from Marquette in the Cotton Bowl game in Dallas, Texas.


