Leading Golfers Enter \$10,000 Miami Open

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 23.—With completion of play in the Summer golf loop, which was dominated by the scoring of Ralph Guldahl, Harry Cooper and Byron Nelson, the next big fairway objective is the classic sponsored by Col. Henry L. Doherty, president of the Florida Year-Resident Clubs—the eighth annual Miami Biltmore \$10,000 open tournament, which will be played Dec. 10-13.

Among the more than 250 entries will be Guldahl, who took the \$2,500 first prize in this Winter classic last year despite a two-stroke penalty at the 61st hole. Challenging his right to the title will be Nelson, Belmont Open winner; Cooper, Canada Open champion; and Denny Shute, member of the Miami Biltmore staff for the third time and the second successive year, who this year successfully defended his P. G. A. title, and other perennial top-notchers.

Amateurs again will play for the trophy, among the former winners of which is Johnny Goodman, the newly-crowned amateur champion. He may again be a contender in the South this December.

Hutchinson Goes Over Line for Dartmouth

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makeshift tents and umbrellas in the stands. After Harvard had prowled unsuccessfully in enemy territory at the start of the first half, Will Hutchinson ran 62 yards to a touchdown from a fake kick formation, eluding three Harvard men by a sudden swerve from the right side lines. Bobbie Gibson kicked the extra point.

FIRST PERIOD.

Stubbornly buffeting at the muscular Dartmouth line and getting the best of it was MacDonald hooked up with Hutchinson in a kicking fracas, Harvard had only a foot to go for a first down on New Hampshire's 17 at the start of the game. Gambling on the boldness of the unexpected play, Oakes chucked a forward to MacDonald, who was running in the clear behind the goal line. But the mud-crusted balloon slid off his hands and the Crimson lost their only chance to score in the quarter.

As the quarter waned, Hutchinson started to roll. Getting the ball on their own 32, Hutchinson swept his way to the 36 in two rushing plays. Starting from his 38 in a fake kick formation, Hutchy swept around his left end and ran down the slippery grass of the side lines. A lone blocker spilled him as he ran. Then, as three gentlemen in Crimson jerseys closed in on him, Hutchinson cut sharply from the side lines and outran his pursuers. Standing up, he crossed the goal line after going 62 yards. Gibson kicked the extra point.

Gibson kicked to Boston who juggled the egg back to his own 44. A forward pass, Oakes to Daughters fizzled. Then MacLeod kicked to Hutchinson, who fumbled on the Dartmouth 13. Green recovered for Harvard as the period ended.

SECOND QUARTER.

As the spatter of rain turned into a raging downpour, MacDonald made five yards to Dartmouth's 8. Oakes failed to gain, then lost a yard as the young men from the snowy hills held in the mud and the gale. Back on his own 23, Boston tried a field goal but the placement was short. After an exchange of kicks and a 15-yard penalty for roughness had given Harvard the ball in Dartmouth's territory, Oakes and MacDonald hooked up to get the ball to the Dartmouth 32.

Using the old K. F. 79, MacDonald slithered around left end for 12 yards. Two running plays gained only two yards and, throwing from the 12-yard line, Harding pitched two forwards which were incomplete. Hutchinson saved a touchdown when he casually flicked down the first chuck which was certain to hit the bull's eye of a Crimson jersey, if not deflected. Harvard gave up the ball, and Dartmouth kicked out of danger.

THIRD PERIOD.

The anger of the storm increased and the rainy wind lashed at the crowd, many of whom left. But the weather was not half as bad as Hutchinson, as far as Harvard was concerned. With the quarter only three minutes old, MacDonald kicked feebly from his own 40 to Dartmouth's 45. After Hollingworth had been sprawled on the battle line, Hutchinson ran 55 yards for his second touchdown.

Starting on his own 35, Hutch got going on a fake reverse. Sliding and clawing, he was hit as he passed the line of scrimmage. Yanking himself out of a fall, he sped down the field, crossing the goal line, standing up. Gates kicked the extra point.

Gibson then kicked to Green, who got the ball back to Harvard's 22. A pass over the line, Oakes to Daughters, gave Harvard a first down on Dartmouth's 44. With Oakes and MacDonald doing the heavy work, Harvard wound up on Dartmouth's 14, after three consecutive first downs.

Dartmouth took the ball on the 10 yard line after a running play failed to make the necessary ten yards for Harvard. Hutchinson fumbled behind his goal line but fell on the ball. Again he bobbed, and this time he was tackled by Daughters, which gave Harvard 2 points on a safety.
