

# PRESERVING THE INTEGRITY OF TRADITIONAL CONJUNTO MUSIC AND HISPANIC CULTURE

The Narciso
Martínez Cultural
Arts Center is an
organization dedicated to the preservation, promotion
and development
of the rich and cultural heritage of the
Mexicano community. This heritage
includes the visual



arts, music, theater, dance and literary works.

Narciso Martínez was born in 1911 in Reynosa, Tamaulipas, Mexico, but lived most of his life near San Benito, Texas. The Narciso Martínez Cultural Arts Center was named in his honor as the result of his philosophy of being a proud man of Mexican



ancestry and working class origins; a man of the people who over the years gave of himself and his musical talents so that others could enjoy his contributions; a man who was willing to share his rich musical and Texas-Mexican border experience.

He has been labeled as

"the father of Texas-Mexican conjunto."

Narciso was the first successful recording artist who made hundreds of recordings of mostly instru-

mental dance tunes emphasizing the melodic side of the accordion and leaving the bass parts to his bajo sexto player, according to Arhoolie Records. This established a new sound, a sound which to this day

is immediately identifiable as Texas-Mexican Conjunto Music.

In 1935 with Narciso on the accordion, teamed with bajo sexto player Santiago Almeida on the bajo sexto, they began a highly productive collaboration leading to the establishment of their



new sound in an embryonic conjunto style. In 1935 Narciso and Santiago made musical history with the recordings of the polka La Chicharronera and the schottishche El Tronconal on the Bluebird record label. The results were impressive and Narciso Martínez was on his way to becoming the most prolific and most popular accordion player after 1935. He



was given the epithet of "El Huracan del Valle" in recognition of the great storm of popularity his music generated. He was indeed, a pathfinder.


Narciso Martínez led the evolution of a new style of accordiondriven music, until his death at the age of 64 in 1992. He represents



a major historical artist not only for the Rio Grande Valley but for the rest of country as well. Narciso recorded through 1991 before falling ill in 1992, and performed for various events locally and state-wide. In 1982 Don Narciso was inducted into the Conjunto Hall of Fame in San Antonio, Texas. In 1983 he received the National Heritage Award from the National Endowment of the Humanities in Washington, D. C.

Other facets of the Arts Center include a writers' forum, periodic speakers/lectures/performances, accordion and guitar lessons, poetry readings, book signings, art exhibits and of course, the annual Conjunto Music Festival that attracts thousands of conjunto enthusiasts from across the country. That event is typically held in October and features a three-day lineup of quality accordion-based musicians who thrill the crowd of spectators and cause spontaneous dancing and cheering during these fun-filled, star-lit performances.





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
