# Air School Site Claim Discredited

WASHINGTON.—Reports that the air academy site selection board has narrowed down its choice to five locations, none in Texas, were discredited at the Pentagon Tuesday.  
Rep. Paul W. Shafer (Rep.) of Michigan said the site selection board can't agree on one location, but has trimmed the choice down to five. He listed these as St. Mary's, Calif.; Colorado Springs, Colo.; Alton, Ill.; Madison, Ind., and Battle Creek, Mich.  
Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson's office was informed by Col. Arthur E. Boudreau, secretary to the site board, that he knew of no basis for Shafer's statement.  
Boudreau informed Johnson's office that the board is working in secret and he doubted if any member had disclosed anything about the deliberations.  
The board, if unable to agree unanimously on a site, must recommend three locations to Air Force Secretary Harold E. Talbott, who must pick one of these three.  
A previous site board had narrowed down desirable locations to seven, three in Texas, the Grapevine Lake site, a location in Grayson County on Lake Texoma and Randolph Field, San Antonio.  
The new board, named by Air Secretary Harold Talbott, evidently is having difficulty in reaching a decision, judging from the time it is taking to make an announcement of a recommendation to Talbott.  
Members of the board are Virgil M. Hancher, president, University of Iowa; Merrill C. Meigs, vice-president, the Hearst Corporation, Chicago; Brig. Gen. Charles A. Lindbergh; Gen. Charles A. Spatz, retired, and Lt. Gen. Hubert R. Harmon, special assistant to Talbott for academy matters.

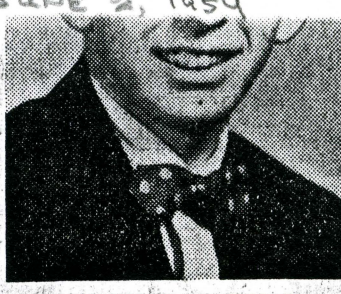

# Sutton Draw Wildcat Trial

Ada Oil Company, Houston, announced a three-well wildcat exploration program in the vicinity of Sonora in Sutton County.  
A mile west of town is location No. 1 Rip Ward, an 8,200-foot project 760 from the south and 1,000 from the west lines of section 10, HE&WT.  
To be drilled over three miles southeast of Sonora is No. 1 Tom Fields, 660 from the north and 1,000 from the east lines of section 10. It is set up as an 8,000-foot hole. Scheduled as a 7,500-foot vertical five miles southwest of the town is No. 1 John D. Fields, 660 from the south and east lines of section 10.  
SCHLEICHER COUNTY.—A 6,000-foot exploration is planned by Anderson Oil Corporation, Oklahoma City, miles southeast of Eldorado and one mile north of the McIntosh Pennsylvania pool. Drillsite is on a 320-acre lease section 22, K&H&SA.  
Plymouth Oil Company has abandoned its No. 1-28 H. A. Thompson, 28-A-HE seven miles south of Eldorado. Hole to 3,490 feet.  
TOM GREEN COUNTY.—Childress Mining Company, Dallas, has given up on a 6,800-foot operation 1 mile southeast of Christoval. It is located on No. 1 G. H. DeWolf, 660 from the south and west lines of section 10, H&TC.

# Pay Test Slated For Wildcat in Fisher County

Pay try was under way Tuesday at a Fisher County exploration over a mile north of Roby. It was carried into the pre-Cambrian.  
General Crude Oil Company, 1 E. C. Parker, subdivision 13, trop CSL survey No. 314, drilled to 7,020 feet. After log run, operator took sidewall in the 5,300-foot level and the casing to 5,488 feet.  
Casing was perforated at 5,100 in what apparently is the St. Louis initial test.  
NOLAN COUNTY.—Casing has been bottom at 5,890 for pay tests in Hooker & Hill and Signal Oil & Gas Co. Boyd, 61-21-T&P, five miles east of Sweetwater. On last stem 5,895-90 recovery was oil and gas-cut with salt water.  
STONEWALL COUNTY.—In the part of this county ten miles north of Hamlin and northeast of the South Top Field, Cities Service Oil Corp. is to drill No. 1-124 Flat Top as a test. Location is 2,300 from the north 1,500 from the west lines of section 10, BBB&C.  
HASKELL COUNTY.—Completion has been made on an old wildcat fifteen miles northeast of Stamford three miles northeast of the R. pool. Newton-Phenix Oil Corp. is to drill No. 1-W. P. Bickley, 1-ETRR, pumps barrels of oil per day plus 50 per barrel of water from the Strawn at 4,496-50. This well originally was drilled by Ranger in 1951.
