While I am sure you would not use it in any way, I hesitated to send out a copy to anyone, however I am sending both you and Sam Rayburn one merely for your own personal information.

It looks like we have come to the crossroads of who is going to run the government and there should be no hesitation as to what the answer will be - at least we hope so. So keep up the good work. No one is any more interested in seeing that labor has a perfectly square deal than I am, and your plan for freezing the status of the situation as it now exists is not unfair to either side. Any other method would be unfair to the American public.
