Dr. Edgar said the letter would be studied and a reply sent within a few days.

He said that Euless school authorities some time ago asked the State Board of Education to join them in the federal court suit. which later resulted in a ruling by Judge Joseph B. Dooley that

Petty, 37, lives at 2508 N. W. 27th. He told officers after his arrest that he lost his head after he and his wife separated. Petty's lawyers have announced they will plead insanity in his defense.

When that request was received, Edgar added, the state board did not see how it could enter the case.

After Judge Dooley made his ruling, a building was set aside in the Mosier Valley community of Euless for a Negro school. On enrollment day last week, parents of 35 Negro children appeared at the white school and asked that the children be admitted there.

The Negroes said the Negro school was not fit for use by humans and was not equal to the white school. They were accom-panied, by officials of the Fort Worth and Dallas chapters of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.
