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Donald W. Nyrop, Newly Appointed CAA Administrator, Due to Visit Here

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23 .- Another career man in the government had worked his way up to the top when President Truman this week announced the appointment of Donald W. Nyrop, 38, as the new administrator of the Civil Aeronautics Administration.

Nyrop, who will be in Fort Worth during the week of Oct. 16. is considered so perfectly fitted for his promotion that the Senate paid him the high compliment of confirming his nomination as the new CAA chief within 48 hours after the president sent his name to Capitol Hill.

A Nebraskan by birth, Nyrop has been active in civil and military aviation for the past 11 years. For more than two years, he has held the No. 2 job of CAA-deputy administrator.

REPLACING OLD FRIEND.

As administrator, Nyrop is replacing an old friend with a career similar to[®] his own-Delos Rentzel of Houston.

At the same time Truman nominated Nyrop to be CAA administrator, he named Rentzel to membership on the Civil Aeronautics Board, and it is known throughout Washington that the president will make Rentzel chairman of the board within a few weeks.
