Borrowed Hat 'for Luck'

Funnyman Hope's Golf Was Good But His Gab Was Even Better

Bob Hope came within two strokes of par on eight holes at River Crest Country Club Sunday when he fired 33 in a benefit match with Byron Nelson, Raymond Gafford and Jimmy Nichols for the Star-Telegram Free Milk and Ice Fund.

But his gab was even better than his golf, keeping the links crowd laughing from his tee-off slice to the final putt on No. 11 hole. The game was cut short so the comedian could catch a 5 p. m. plane for Hollywood—"to make a few retakes with Jane Russell," he said.

Hope ended the match attired in a hat borrowed from Amon Carter "for luck" and a camel's hair overcoat given him by Carter, in addition to a tie with

a hand-painted oil well on it, presented in behalf of Brock Maxwell.

Several thousand spectators lined both sides of the first tee, and dozens secured autographs from the radio and movie star between holes. When a little cocker spaniel trotted across the fairway, Hope cracked:

"Crosby'd throw a saddle on that and race it."

During the match, Hope paused to introduce a friend from Holly-

wood, Movie Director David Butler, with the comment:

"Directors don't have to do anything. They just push actors around."

At the final hole, Hope and W. A. Moncrief, who acted as referee, reminded the crowd of the Milk and Ice Fund boxes in the hands of 20 DBS Sorority girls, into one of which Hope slipped a \$50 bill.

His departure after the game wound up a five-day visit, during which he hunted quail, inspected oil properties, staged an audience-winning benefit show in Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum and attended the Notre Dame-SMU football game in the Cotton Bowl Saturday. The Friday night show in the coliseum also was for the Milk and Ice Fund.
