Eisenhower Names Board For American Assembly

The national policy board for the American Assembly is now "virtually complete," General Eisenhower announced Monday through the assembly headquarters at Columbia University.

The group will function as directors on assembly sessions two or three times a year at Arden House in Harriman, N. Y.

The objective of the assembly sessions as stated by General Eisenhower, is "to clarify and increase the understanding of issues important to the American people."

Cross-Section of Opinion.

Sixty to 80 delegates, representing a cross-section of opinion in the United States, will be invited by Eisenhower and the policy board to participate.

Former Ambassador Lewis Douglas is chairman of the policy board, which will include representatives of labor, business and agriculture.

In his Monday announcement Eisenhower released the names of 14 members, including one woman and Douglas, who will sit on the policy board and make such major policy decisions as subjects to be discussed and delegates to be invited.

Serving on the policy board will be Harry A. Bullis, Minneapolis, board chairman of General Mills; Philip Young, Columbia University dean; Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby, Houston newspaper executive and former director of the WAC; James A. Farley, New York, board chairman of Coca-Cola Export Corporation and prominent Catholic layman; Allan B. Kline, Vinton, Iowa, president of the Farm Bureau Federation.

Also, John Cowles, Minneapolis newspaper executive; William Green, Washington, president of the AFL; Robert M. Hanes, Winston-Salem, N. C., president of Wachovia Bank and Trust Company; William C. Mullendore,

Los Angeles, president Southern California Edison Company; Jacob S. Potofsky, New York, president of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America; William I. Myers, Cornell University dean; Robert E. Wood, Chicago, board chairman of Sears Roebuck and Company, and Leonard F. McCollum, Ponca City, Okla., president of Continental Oil Company.

The first session of the American Assembly will be May 21-26. The subject to be discussed will be United States-Western European relationships against the background of the worldwide Communist threat and how far we should go to protect Western Europe from communism.

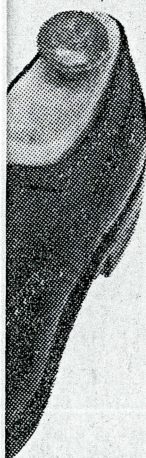
