**Fort Worth Newspaper  
Hails Completion of  
New Bomber Factory  
With Special Edition**

Fort Worth, Tex., April 19. — The Fort Worth Star-Telegram commemorated in a 188-page special Sunday edition the completion of the Fort Worth Consolidated Aircraft Corporation's bomber plant—two months ahead of schedule.

In a front-page Washington-dated story the paper reported that the war department hailed the achievement as an outstanding job, resulting from the accelerated war production program.

The edition was illustrated with pictures of the plant and the bombers it is making.

Consolidated turns out four-motored B-24 bombers, and a section of the special edition detailed in pictures how they are built.

The Star-Telegram said: "The plant has been delivered by the Austin Co., construction contractors, to the corps of engineers. The engineers, in turn, have delivered it to the war department. The war department has assigned it to the army air corps which, in turn, has delivered it to Consolidated for operation."

Every workman on the job of building the huge plant received a letter of commendation, while the Austin company itself has been officially praised for its speed.

The Star-Telegram's combined afternoon-morning circulation is the largest in Texas, rated at more than 175,000 daily.
