

Lewis Gives Dewey Nod

Miners

MW Delegates Told Best Choice Lies in 'Non-Critical' Man

CINCINNATI, Oct. 8 (AP)—John Lewis indirectly endorsed Republican presidential candidate Dewey Friday and called for a "play" so the miners could vote Nov. 2.

A long resolution on political action, reviewing Lewis' criticism of Truman, a special committee declared that: "As to the other major party candidate for president of the United States, we can only say to our knowledge, he has uttered any statements that tend to impugn the integrity or the loyalty of the United Mine Workers of America, or its officers or its members.

It is our opinion that the UMWW should depart from its political position or its constitutional provisions by placing this factual matter before you (the convention) for consideration.

Report Concluded.

The members are satisfied that the members of the United Mine Workers, wives and dependents can be relied upon to protect their rights, their homes and their interests.

It is concluded that this report by the committee recommending the defeat of our friends, and the election of our friends." A resolution was adopted by a vote of 1,000 to 1,000, but it was not acted upon unanimously.

On acting on it, the delegates were told by Vice President Kennedy to "let your committee be your guide on Nov. 2."

B-36 Being Tested Now With Parasite Fighter in Bomb Bay, Air Writers Told

The gigantic B-36 Convair Superfortress is now being tested that with a parasite fighter plane, carried inside its bomb bay," Gen. George C. Kenney, chief of the Strategic Air Command, and Maj. Gen. Roger M. Ramey, 8th Air Force commander, revealed Friday.

The news, upon which the general declined to elaborate, came as the Air Force presented the mammoth warplane to more than 79 of the nation's leading civilian aviation writers.

The writers were told of the ship's specifications, accomplishments and future performance expectations and saw the process of its manufacture during the morning and early afternoon.

Will Take Flights.

Between 4 and 5 p. m., the men, in groups of 12, were to make short flights in six of the aircrafts to observe air handling and other actual flight activities.

Afterwards they were to attend a Shady Oak party, given by Amon Carter, to compare their individual notes on the B-36, which General Kenney predicted will accomplish a 12,000-mile nonstop flight before the end of 1948.

At the preflight briefing, Kenney said the Air Force has no fears of the B-36's inability to fly a 10,000-mile mission or its inability to carry a 10,000-pound bomb load. He stated the ship can do that and still have hours of gasoline left after completing its mission.

Will Fly 12,000 Miles.

In opening the conference, Kenney stated that he was "here to lay ghosts of rumors that the B-36 will fly 12,000 miles."

"I would like to tell the prophets of doom now," he continued, "before this year is up the B-36 will fly 12,000 miles nonstop."

Ramey related that the Air Force has made good its statement "didn't know where the rumors started."

Boards to Get Farmer Draft Status Report

Tarrant County draft officials will confer with County Agent Ruhman before classifying farmers in 2-C deferred status.

R. A. Caraway, principal registrar for the county's four selective service boards, said Friday that the conference would probably be held early next week.

Purpose of the conference will be to obtain farm production figures which are essential in determining a farmer's status in the draft.

Draft directives specify that a farmer classified 2-C must produce a substantial quantity of products for market and for national interest, health and safety.

Writ Denied in Fight for Right To Rent Building

Dave J. Kahler Friday was denied an injunction to restrain the city of Fort Worth from interfering with the use of an accessory building on Kahler's property at 3609 Washburn Ave. as a dwelling place.

The injunction was denied by Judge Renfro in 96th District Court. Kahler said he had spent \$2,000 remodeling the building on the rear of his property and had rented it when told he could do so by city officials.

City Attorney Floore told the court use of the building as a dwelling place violated the neighborhood's residential zoning classification. He denied that Kahler had been given permission to rent it as living quarters.

The city zoning board of adjustment previously had denied Kahler's plea that he be allowed to rent the building at variance with the zoning law.

"In the face of present world unrest," Ramey commented, "it is comforting to have the B-36 and other late model planes on the flight line rather than the drawing boards."
