

President Raps 15 Pct. 'Ceiling' Put on Liberty

WILLIAMSBURG, Va., May 15 (INS).—President Eisenhower took a slap Friday at Americans who say they like liberty as long as it doesn't cost them more than "15 per cent" of their income.

The chief executive unloosed the criticism in a brief off-the-cuff speech as he accepted an honorary doctor of laws degree from historic William and Mary College.

The president also declared that "it is necessary to seek out and uproot any trace of communism any place where it may disrupt the national life."

But he cautioned that the true way to root out communism is to understand the meaning of freedom and thus erect an "impregnable wall" against communism.

He told an audience of some 5,000 students and faculty members gathered on the elm-shaded campus that the nation's teachers should steer their students away from placing too much accent on material values.

Eisenhower declared in accepting his first honorary degree since entering the White House that "there is no security for a free nation in the sword alone."

Rather, he said, security must spring—with the help of the nation's colleges—"from the hearts and minds of free men."

The citation accompanying the president's degree hailed him as a "soldier, statesman, college president, author, artist and sportsman."

It praised him for exhibiting a statesmanship which "revives

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
