Where Does Ike Stand?

Starting Thursday, the News-Herald will publish a series of 12 articles designed to answer the question, "Where does Ike stand?" The bulk of the material will be direct quotes from the private and public utterances of General Dwight D. Eisenhower, arranged by the man who was the General's top assistant in Washington, at Columbia University and SHAPE headquarters.

As Supreme Commander Allied Powers Europe, Gen. Eisenhower has, to date, restricted many of his political opinions to his personal correspondence and private conversations. It has remained for Kevin McCann, who was associated with the General from 1945 until August, 1951, to assemble "Eisenhower's Political Creed" from these off-the-record sources.

On special occasions, Gen. Eisenhower has touched upon political questions in his public statements, some of which have also been incorporated in the articles.

"Eisenhower's Political Creed" will trace the pattern of the General's thinking, in terms of domestic and foreign policy, from the close of World War II to the present. It will outline the chief elements of Dwight Eisenhower's political philosophy.
