Board Makes 5-Hour Tour Of Site for Air Academy

The site selection board for the United States third major institution of military training, the Air Force Academy, was given a five-hour showing Tuesday of an area near the Grapevine Lake project during an inspection tour conducted by officials and committeemen of the Fort Worth and Dallas Chambers of Commerce, joint sponsors of the proposed site.

Leaving Fort Worth at 9 a. m. Tuesday by automobile, board members and the Fort Worth-Dallas group named to show them the site stopped first in Grapevine and from there began a scheduled four-hour inspection tour that was extended into a five-hour trip.

Proceeding to the Grapevine Lake project, the visitors were given a sweeping view of the reservoir area and a part of the 9,000-acre site proposed by the Fort Worth and Dallas chambers in a joint brief.

The tour of the Grapevine Dam and reservoir area was conducted by Lt. Col. William P. Jones, executive officer of the Fort Worth District Army engineers, serving with the Fort Worth-Dallas committees.

The tour then moved northward along the eastern edge of the academy site area, through Lewisville, and to other points where the board was shown other areas which could be added to the proposed site if needed.

Headed by Gen. Carl Spaatz, board chairman, the site selection group halted the motor procession several times for a closer view and inspection of the countryside. The other board members on the tour were Lt. Gen. H. A. Harmon, Brig. Gen. Harold C. Clark, Lt. Col. Arthur E. Boudreau and Dr. Bruce Hopper, Harvard University professor.

Representing the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce on the inspection trip were William Holden, executive vice president; Harold S. Foster, industrial department manager, and two chamber aviation committeemen, H. H. Morse and Amon Carter. The Dallas Chamber of Commerce was represented by Ben Critz, vice

president and general manager; Tom Finney, industrial department manager, and Dale Miller, Washington representative of the chamber.

Grapevine and Denton Chamber of Commerce officials and committeemen also went along on the tour, and the trip was extended to Academy Site on Page 4.

ISSUE A BOMB ULTIMATUM TO RUSSIA, SENATORS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (INS). Senator O'Mahoney of Wyoming demanded Tuesday night that an ultimatum be issued at once to Russia to stop the Communist forces in Korea under threat of the atomic bomb.

O'Mahoney asserted in an impassioned speech on the Senate floor that the Chinese Reds are following the bidding "of their masters in the Kremlin," and declared:

"I feel that Congress and the executive branch must be prepared now in defense of American citizens and American soldiers to issue an ultimatum to the masters in the Kremlin.

"I would not listen to another word at the United Nations in New York from Jacob Malik or the Chinese puppets until they absolutely agree to stop the Chinese attacks on the United Nations forces in Korea.

"Must Be No Delay." "There must be no delay. We must speak.

"We have the weapon—it is the atomic bomb."

O'Mahoney's demands came after a number of Republican senators, including the top GOP spokesman on atomic affairs, asserted that General MacArthur should be authorized to use the A-bomb if necessary to crush Communist armies in Korea.

At the same time, Senator Cain of Washington called on

the Senate to demand United Nations give MacArthur power to strike at Communist forces in Manchuria. "If that without such authority our armies are lost, our nation is sacrificed."
