Dear Lyndon:

Mr. J. A. Yedgar, 3330 Camp Bowie Boulevard, Fort Worth, Texas, has brought to my attention his efforts to bring his daughter, Mansjan Yedgar, House No. 92A/1/231, Sinak Street, Bagdad, IRAQ (State Department # VD 150) to the United States, the application for which was made February 20, 1946.

I have read quite a few pieces of correspondence between you, Mr. Yedgar and Mr. H. J. L'Heureux, Chief of the Visa Division, State Department, and while I am confident you have made every effort possible to have Miss Yedgar's application expedited, at the same time I am sympathetic with Mr. Yedgar and wonder if anything additional might be done.

Mr. Yedgar has been a U. S. Citizen for many years and has been a good citizen in our City. His being a U. S. Citizen has not been detrimental to Iraq as he is in the rug business and imports and sells their products. His daughter has no relatives living in IRAQ and Mr. Yedgar is very anxious to have her with him. He would be financially responsible for her and of course she would become an American citizen as soon as possible.

As you are thoroughly familiar with the matter, I am sure you know Iraq is very soon closing all deportations of their citizens to any other country and Mr. Yedgar feels this is his last possible effort to have his daughter come to him. If there is anything more you can possibly think of to do in his behalf, I shall appreciate it very much.
