

100 Business Leaders Added to Committee For Fair-Deal Airport

Delegation to Washington to Seek Formal City Backing Before Trip

Bolstered by a new general committee of ninety-one business leaders of Dallas County, the special citizens committee on the Midway Airport tangle will meet with the Dallas City Council at 2 p.m. Wednesday for final formulation of plans before leaving for Washington and a showdown fight.

Nathan Adams, chairman of the citizens committee, and Mayor Woodall Rodgers appointed outstanding civic and business figures to the general committee and then planned to get official backing of the city.

The City Council will be asked to pass an official resolution embracing the key points of Dallas' bid for complete neutrality and fair play in the construction of buildings at Midway Airport and the subsequent developments by the air lines.

Adams' committee will leave for Washington Friday and appear at hearings Monday and Tuesday before Secretary of Commerce Jesse Jones, the Civil Aeronautics Board

and the Civil Aeronautics Administration.

"We will carry every piece of ammunition gathered over months of study, including technical conclusions reached by engineers, to make our case in Washington," said Mayor Rodgers. "In it all is still the one theme upon which we started—a fair deal for Dallas and a neutral airport for the great bulk of the patronage Dallas gives the air lines."

If Dallas doesn't get that sort of an answer from the federal authorities it will immediately start down other avenues, Rodgers indicated.

Members of the executive committee going to Washington include Adams, J. B. Adoue Jr., Fred F. Florence, Ernest Tennant, John W. Carpenter, B. F. McLain, Ted Dealey, Tom C. Gooch, County Judge Al Templeton, Dr. E. H. Cary, R. D. Suddarth, Paul Carrington and Dave Y. Robb. It was not known whether Karl Hoblitzelle and R. L. Thornton would be able to make the trip.

Also on the Washington trip will be Mayor Rodgers, Acting City Manager V. R. Smitham, Public Works Director Guy Rollins and City Attorney Henry Kucera, General Committee.

Mount Calvary Church Restrains Minister From Holding Meetings

A temporary restraining order to prevent the Rev. A. W. Walsh from interfering with religious worship at the Mount Calvary Baptist Church, Haskell and Caldwell, and from conducting any meetings there himself, was issued Tuesday by Judge W. L. Thornton in the Forty-Fourth District Court.

The order was issued on petition of E. R. Ambrose, chairman, and other members of the church's board of deacons.

Ambrose told Judge Thornton that Walsh had been serving as pastor of the church on a week-to-week basis for a salary of \$19 a week. He showed a record of a meeting of the church's official board Sunday night at which twenty-nine members voted unanimously that the pulpit was vacant.

Since that time, however, the preacher has threatened to hold his own meetings in the church and has a key to the building, Ambrose said.

Judge Thornton set the injunction for a hearing at 9:30 a.m. Monday.
