

City's Future In Aviation To Be Studied

Conference Slated Soon to Speed Postwar Program

A conference of city, federal and air line officials, local and Washington figures will be held within two weeks to speed progress in developing Dallas as one of the nation's outstanding postwar aviation centers, Mayor Woodall Rodgers said Saturday.

Congressman Hatton W. Summers and Dale Miller, Washington representatives of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, will be in Dallas within two weeks and when they arrive the conference will be called immediately.

Others who will be invited will include officials of American Airlines, Braniff Airways, Delta Airlines, President B. F. McLain of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, County Judge Al Templeton, L. C. Elliott, Regional Civil Aeronautics Administration executive, and others, the Mayor said.

Data is now being assembled on nine prospective airport sites and this will be ready for CAA study by the end of July. At the joint conference, Mayor Rodgers hopes the group will be able to center on one or two new airport sites to be obtained as soon as possible.

Then all data will be submitted to federal officials and efforts made to obtain help from Washington in developing them. Military use will be invited for the duration.
