**EDITORS FLY
IN BIG PLANE**

New York (UP).—The giant S-42, largest amphibian plane in the world, recently tested by Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, leaves this week on its maiden trip to South America with newspaper executives making a full complement of passengers.

The passenger list of Pan-American's big Sikorsky includes: John Cowles, of Des Moines Register; Jerome Barnum, Syracuse publisher; Roy W. Howard, chairman of the board of the Scripps-Howard publications; J. H. Furay, vice president of the United Press; Frank Gannett, publisher of the Gannett newspapers; William Brooks, of The Associated Press; Paul Patterson, of The Baltimore Sun; John Wheeler, of the Bell Syndicate, and George Rial, Pan-American executive. All will embark at New York.

They will be joined at Washington by: Juan Trippe, president of Pan-American Airways, and Eugene Vidal, Department of Commerce official.

At Miami the following will board the ship: James G. Stahlman, Nashville publisher; S. Swazey, of Los Angeles; Amon Carter, Fort Worth
