PUBLISHERS TO GET OFF TODAY

On 15,000-Mile Flight to
South America

GATHERING AT MIAMI

Eight Publishers and A. P.
Man In the Party

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 15 (AP).—To increase personal knowledge of commercial and social trends in South America, a group of publishers and aviation officials gathered here tonight for the flight to the Southern continent tomorrow.

The party will make the 15-day, 15,000-mile journey over Carribean islands and east coast South American countries in the Brazilian Clipper, commercial plane which recently established world records in many transport classes.

The Brazilian Clipper's flight to South America will be the initial trip for the large aircraft, and it will be christened at Rio de Janeiro by Senora Getulie Fargas, wife of the President of Brazil.

Eight members and a special representative of the Associated Press are among those making the trip. They are:

James G. Stahlman, publisher of the Nashville Banner; Frank E. Gannett, chairman of the Gannett newspapers; John Cowles, associate publisher of the Des Moines Register and Tribune; Roy Howard, publisher of the New York World Telegram; Paul Patterson, publisher of the Baltimore Sun; Jerome D. Barnum, publisher of the Syracuse Post-Standard and vice president of the American Newspaper Publishers Association; H. V. Jenkins, publisher of the Savannah Morning News and the Savannah Evening Press; Amon G. Carter, publisher of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, and William F. Brooks, executive assistant to the general manager of the Associated Press.

Mr. Jenkins and Mr. Carter arrived here today. The others are expected to reach here late tonight by special plane from the East.

Leaving here tomorrow morning, the plane halts for the night at San Juan, Puerto Rico. The second night will be spent at Georgetown, British Guiana. Succeeding night stops will be made at Para and Natal, Brazil, before reaching Rio de Janeiro.
