I think that few men have rendered service to his day and generation and to his Nation in a like degree as has Vice-President Garner. During his many years in Congress and while serving as Vice-President of the United States, he has always championed the best interests of the average man. He would make a great president.

You are indeed to be congratulated upon this very fine thing you have done. You are always doing something which is big, magnanimous and worth while.

While I think President Roosevelt has made a very definite contribution to the welfare of our Nation, and I favor a great deal of the work he has done, however, there are some things which have been done by the Administration which I think are very hurtful to the best interests of the Nation.
