EIGHT KILLED AS AIR LINER CRASHES CLOSE TO ST. LOUIS

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 6 (AP).—Eight persons aboard a Chicago and Southern Air Liner were killed in an unexplained crash near Lambert-St. Louis airport Wednesday night.

AUTO COLLISION COSTS 7 LIVES

NILES, Mich., Aug. 6 (AP).—Two automobiles crashed headon three miles south of here on U. S. Highway 31 early today, killing seven persons.

Three of the victims were privates from Fort Jefferson, Mo., remaining here overnight en route to the scene of extensive army maneuvers which begin today in Southwestern Michigan.

The dead: Joe Hill, 22, Niles, driver of one of the cars.

Pvts. Eugene Newby, 23; Howard C. Kelly, 23, and Herbert Mizer, 18, all of St. Louis, who were riding with Hill.

Roy Warner, 22, Culver, Ind., driver of the other automobile.

Richard A. Peterson, 22, and Lorene Barr, both of South Bend, Ind.

Peterson and Miss Barr were passengers in Warner's machine.

2 Killed, 13 Injured as Bus Overturns

HUNTINGDON, Pa., Aug. 6 (AP).—A huge Pittsburgh to New York bus overturned twice in a rainstorm on a mountainside 12 miles west of Huntingdon early Thursday, killing two persons and injuring 13.

Six of the 15 passengers were trapped beneath the wreckage and

The wreckage, strewn through a plowed field for 200 yards, was not found until early Thursday, almost four hours after the plane plunged to the ground.

Investigators seeking the cause had only the ship's intact instruments and the story of an eyewitness to aid them.

Plane Banked Sharply.

Ralph L. Sharp, Fairfield, Ohio, visitor at a farm near the scene of the crash, said he saw the plane bank steeply and turn back toward the airport, from which it had taken off a few minutes before, en route from New Orleans to Chicago.

He heard the plane crash a moment later after it went over a knoll and was obscured from his view.

George Beklmann, on whose farm the ship fell, said he heard the plane and noted the unusually loud roar of its motors.

Searchers found the bodies of the pilot and co-pilot, their arms locked about each other, about 50 feet from part of the wrecked cabin.

Bodies of the passengers, many badly mangled, were scattered about the twisted main fuselage.

Failed to Find Wreck.

Sharp and Ben Haverkamp, whom he is visiting, searched unsuccessfully in the dark for the plane before Sharp went to the airport and reported the crash.

COUPLE WILL DINE AT CASA MANANA, SEE LAST FRONTIER

The Frontier Centennial was ready Thursday for a spotlight of fame when the second family of the Nation pays its visit this evening.

The Vice President and Mrs. Garner were to leave Dallas, where they were guests at the Central Centennial Exposition, in time to arrive in Fort Worth at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Accompanied by W. B. Yeager, secretary of the Federal Centennial Commission, they were to be met at the county line by Barney Oldfield, official Frontier Centennial host; Elliott Roosevelt, Silliman Evans, Raymond Buck and Amon Carter, and escorted to the Fort Worth Club.

There the distinguished couple were to rest before proceeding to the show grounds.

Show Slicked Up.

Out at the playground of the Nation everything was slicked up and on its tiptoes for the Garners. The Vice President and his wife will view the Will Rogers Memorial Room in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Exhibit Hall before dining at Casa Manana.

In the dinner party for the first show at the cafe-theater also will be United States Senators Connally and Sheppard; Fred Florence and R. L. Thornton of the Central Centennial Exposition at Dallas; Congressman Lanham and other Texas members of Congress.

The couple will be guests of the Frontier Centennial and Carter.

Will Hold Train.

Later in the evening they will view the glorified Wild West spectacle, "The Last Frontier." The M.-K.-T. train, which is scheduled to leave here at 11:15 p. m., will be held 30 minutes so the Vice President can see the complete show.

A group of Fort Worth women will be hostesses at an informal dinner for Mrs. Garner at Casa Manana. Those in the hostess group will be Mrs. Edwin T. Phillips, official hostess for the show; Meses. Elliott Roosevelt, Sheppard, Lanham, Evans, Buck and W. C. Strippling. Several Dallas women will be over for the show.

FIVE GROUPS TO ATTEND SHOW

Three sizable out-of-town groups and two local organizations plan special events at the Frontier Centennial tonight.
