Ex-Airlines Stewardesses To Organize National Setup

Former American Airlines stewardesses from New York to Los Angeles will arrive in Fort Worth this week-end to set up the national organization of Kiwi Clubs composed of former stewardesses grounded by marriage.

The meeting of Kiwi delegates will be held here Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday with headquarters at Western Hills Hotel, where all the business sessions will be held.

The delegates will select a slate of officers for the national organization, set up by-laws, establish a permanent national headquarters and investigate the possibilities of holding a national convention.

Welcoming Tea.

Registration will open at 11 a. m. Monday in the penthouse at the hotel. The convention will formally open with introduction of delegates and special guests at 1 p. m. From 3 to 4 p. m., the Fort Worth Kiwi Club will entertain with a welcoming tea. A temporary chairman for the organization will be elected at a business session from 4 to 5 p. m.

Tuesday's activities will begin with a business session at 10 a. m. Committee members will be nom-

inated at that meeting. O. M. Mosier, vice president of American Airlines, will give a luncheon for the delegates at the hotel from noon until 2 p. m., and a business session will be held from 2 to 4 p. m.

Election of Officers.

Amon Carter will entertain the former stewardesses with a party from 5 to 9 p. m. at Shady Oak Farm.

The national officers will be elected at a meeting from 10 to noon Wednesday, and the final business of the convention will be completed in a session from 1 to 4 p. m.

The national officers will be introduced at the closing banquet to be given by American Airlines at 7 p. m. Wednesday at Colonial Country Club.

Among the guests expected to attend are C. R. Smith, president of American Airlines; Mosier, vice president; R. E. S. Deichler, vice president of sales for American Airlines, and Mrs. Deichler; Walter H. Johnson Jr., secretary and assistant to the president, and Mrs. Johnson; Rex Smith, vice president of public relations for American Airlines, and Miss Kay Hansen, an honorary Kiwi, secretary to Rex Smith.
