SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF..... The man whose big job is to bring peace to the strife-torn ports of the Pacific, arrived here yesterday and immediately swung into action conferring with other Federal officials Longshoremen, Sailors and Owners representatives. Square-shouldered gray-haired Admiral H. G. Hamlet, retired Commander of the Coastguard, believes that the new Maritime Commission which he represents can close the clashed between Unions and employers in shipping circles. "I have no definite plan as yet", he declared on arrival, "but we are going to make a thoroughinvestigation of all phases of the situation, and I believe plans can be worked out that will result in permanent peace."

WASHINGTON, O.O.... Recourse to Government records today disclosed 76 percent of all the millions recently alloted by President Roosevelt for new Public Works Administration projects, is being poured into 28 states where the election fight is hottest.

SAN FRANCISCO. CALLF.... A 4-year old boy dead as the result of a shot through the head by his foster father with a small caliber revolver as he lay sleeping in his crib. A young mother fighting for her life at a San Francisco hospital with a bullet through her left temple unaware of her loss. A young husband and foster-father of the child also near death in another ward at the same hospital with a gunshot wound in the right temple self-inflicted after he had shot the other two. Such was the tragic aftermath of a Saturday night wedding anniversary dance to which jealousy came as an uninvited guest.

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF.... Twenty persons were injured and thousands of others were thrown into near panic in two dramatic incidents that maked yesterday's annual football clash between St. Marys and the U of San Francisco at Kezar Stadium. Seventeen of the injured were burned when hundreds of balloons carrying a political banner exploded into faces of the spectators who had pulled them into the stands. Flaming clouds of gas, twenty feet high, spread into the jammed stands when cigaretts ignited the balloons. Through others met injury in an aftergame riot featured by a police officer who, after clubbing a student, was rushed by others and knocked to the ground and trampled, and who then rose with a menacing grin and gun in hand in an effort to drive off the excited fans.

VENICE, ITALY.... At least twenty-five persons died today in a roaring earthquake which shook north-eastern Italy and touched the north-western section of Jugoslavia and a small section of Austria.

BOMBAY, INDIA.... British troops were called into action today to suppress mass ricting between Hindus and Moslems stretching into the fourth day. Up to last mid-night, at least forty-six persons had been killed and 440 injured in the frequent bloody clashes of Indian factions armed with knives and guns.

MOBILE, ALA.... Capt. H. L. Debauns of the cruiser Margaret" out of Gulf Fort Miss. near here, reports that a giant dekilfish towed his boat with six persons aboard for five hours over the waters of the Mississippi sound, after swallowing the anchor of the vessel from which they were fishing. It is believed that the experience is unique in fishing annals. It was estimated the fish weighed 1,200 pounds and had towed the boat twenty miles.

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF.... Stepping sprightly from the "Hawaiian Clipper" when she landed on the bay at Alameda yesterday was a man who had just spent the past seventeen days in racing around the world. He was H. R. Ekins, reporter, who was greeted by a crowd of 1,500, given a gold nugget emblematic of the 1939 Golden Gate International Exposition by Mayor Rossi, spoke briefly over the radio and then hopped in a United Air Line's plane for Los Angeles to start the last lap of his flight to New York. At 4:40 am., he got away on a TWA plane scheduled to land him in Newark Airport at 10:35 a.m. today at the end of his world flight.

TATHOKU. FORMOSA..... A sensational attempt two years ago to overthrow the Japanese Government and restore Chinese rule came to light today when 516 natives were released from prison. It was disclosed 435 inhabitants of Formosa participated in the plot which reports alleged was instigated by China. Twenty-five prisoners still were being held for trial.

GENEVA.... Japan has withdrawn all her naval forces from the former German islands in the Pacific over which she holds a League of Nations mandatem and has "no fortifications, military or naval bases" in these islands, the Tokio Government informed the League today.

Never beaten as a team, Mrs. Moody and Budge yesterday kept that record intact and established the right to the unofficial No. 1 ranking in mixed foursome competition by defeating Miss Marble and Make before a capacity crowd of 500 at Lakeside. The scores were 6-3, 6-4.
