

MADRID..... Madrid by Saturday was cry of Spanish Fascists. Driving steadily west toward its goal, the insurgent army swept over five towns, in a drive to bring its artillery within range of the Spanish capital. Vigorous offensive brought right wing of insurgent front, seven miles to a point within sixteen miles off Madrid. The Madrid Government troops were forced by onslaught to retreat to within ten miles off the capital and took up position on knoll at El Cerro De Los Angeles.

IPSWICH ENGLAND..... Mrs. Wallis Warfield Simpson, part blue-blooded friend of King Edward, received a 17-minute divorce and with it leave to wed for the third time, six months hence. It was the world's turn to wonder whether the man she marries next, if she does wed again when her decree becomes absolute, April 27, 1937, will be his most excellent Majesty, King Edward the VIII of Great Britain. May 12, 1937, fifteen days later, Edward, formally is to be crowned, unless plans are changed.

Mrs. Wallis Warfield Simpson never will return to the United States, she told a United Press correspondent in an exclusive telephone interview. The United Press correspondent talked to the former Baltimore beauty who divorced her husband at Ipswich today, shortly after 11 p.m., at her town house in London. Mrs. Simpson was bitter at what she considered persecution she has suffered. "I will never return to the United States," Mrs. Simpson said, "after all the nasty things said about me. I could never show my face there again."

FITZBURGH..... Governor Alf M. Landon named the New Deal, "The government of spoilsmen, by spoilsmen and for spoilsmen" in a native state address, and pledged housecleaning of this political debauch if elected. Before keystone state throng, overflowing the 10,000 capacity Duquesne Gardens, the Republican presidential nominee said, Postmaster General Farley, also Democratic National Chairman, had been authorized to create vast army of political mercenaries in order to entrench the presidential administration power. Promising as President to enlarge and strengthen Civil Service and consolidate Government agencies, including 75 new alphabetical "what nots", Landon said, President Roosevelt had created instruments capable of shackling our liberties and enslaving people.

SHANGHAI, CHINA..... Japan is prepared to resort to some other measures to enforce China's acceptance of her demands for settlement of Chino-Japanese differences, if diplomatic negotiations in Nanking fail, the Japanese news agencies reported from Tokyo. Other measures envisaged presumably would be the first break in diplomatic relations, and second application of military force. The Japanese policy was decided after a conference between officials of the Tokyo Foreign Office, and Ministry of War.

ROME, ITALY..... Tempered by heroic efforts against seen and unseen enemies, enters the 15th year of Fascism tomorrow, stronger than ever before, Premier Mussolini said. "The nation is ready to repeat her efforts against anyone in defense of our empire," the Dictator told his followers on the eve of political anniversary. "We have attained our place in the sun. Our pride is legitimate work, we shall carry on in Africa and will be a contribution to civilization, worthy of 1000-year old traditions of Italy," Mussolini asserted.

HAVANA, CUBA..... Police discovered a beautiful young Spanish woman locked up in a room where she said she had been held prisoner for four years. The woman, in her middle twenties, was overwrought to give coherent story, when startled officers stumbled into a room during a raid on a mid-town residence. She told them her father was a millionaire residing in Spain, but that all she could remember of her name was that it was either Lydia or Aida. Her nervous condition made questioning impossible and she did not disclose the name of her alleged captor. Police detained Jose Gregario Silva, who, they said, rented the room four years ago, but released him after questioning.

EL CENTRO..... Frank H. Bowles, radio station manager, today was seeking some means of barring Esco L. Richardson from speaking over KKO, after Federal Radio Communication Commission ruled he was entitled to the same time over air as other candidates. The station manager sought to avert possible repetition of last Friday's riot, in which Richardson, Communist candidate for Congress, was badly beaten by a mob of 200 men. Bowles had sought authority from the Commission to refuse air time to Richardson.

VATICAN CITY..... Reverend Charles E. Coughlin's manner of attack against President Roosevelt, it was reported authoritatively, today, is thoroughly disapproved in the Vatican City. It would be difficult, however, one prelate said, for any action to be taken at this time against the radio priest. The prelate pointed out that any open action by the Vatican at this moment on the eve of the American presidential election, might be construed as meddling in politics.

PROVIDENCE, R.I..... Reverend Charles E. Coughlin tonight said that Mr. Roosevelt's Administration is engaged in the greatest cheap wage enterprise of any person in the history of civilization. He did not refer to reported Vatican's criticism of his statement of last night at Cleveland, that Mr. Roosevelt was a scab President.

SACRAMENTO, CALIF..... President Franklin D. Roosevelt will be invited to participate in the ceremonies at the opening of the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge on November 12, it was announced in Sacramento by Earl Lee Kelly, director of Public Works. The invitation, Kelly said, will be extended by Governor Merriam.

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF..... With few hours remaining before scheduled complete stop of the Pacific Coast shipping at mid-night tonight, the Union and employer representatives will go into final sessions this morning in a last desperate effort to avert the shut down. Many conferences and long meetings, yesterday failed to bring signs of break although in the background were rumors of remotely possible change. However, one who has closely followed every development, said just before mid-night, "I did not see definite sign that might point to peace."

Union leaders flatly declared the strike would be called unless their fundamental demands were granted. Spokesmen for employers were equally adamant in declaring they had stated their position and had nothing further to say. President Roosevelt is the only man who can possibly stop the strike, declared Henry Schmidt, Longshoreman spokesman, last night.

Jerome Herman "Mazy" Dean, record-train pitching star of the St. Louis Cardinals, was placed on block to the highest bidder by Vice-President Branch Rickey, who expressed consensus of the Club executives including President Sam Breadon, that Mazy is not one-man pennant winner he is supposed to be. It was considered significant that Rickey's offer to trade his hurling prima donna came today after Lon Warneke was obtained from the Chicago Cubs, and had been signed to 1937 contract. Also possibly influencing Club's decision, was Dean's recent assertion that he would not report to the Card's new training camp at Daytona Beach, Florida, but would train at Bradentown, his home.

BRADENTOWN, FLA..... Mazy Dean said today, it made no difference who he played for as long as he gets his dough. He said he would pitch for them and show them some doggone good pitching. He also said he was tired of trying to win the pennant single handed for St. Louis Cardinals. He said how would they expect me to win the pennant all alone.

SAN JOSE, CALIF..... George Hamford won a close 10-round decision over Earl Booker last night at San Jose. Tony Sousa KO'd Trent Fair in the third round, Fenny McCalibb dethroned Frankie Cicelli, Eddie Sargota won from Henry Grigsby, and Charley Hendrix defeated Johnny Caruso.

NEW YORK, N.Y..... The annual tournament of Rose's football game at Pasadena which will feature a pair of perfect record teams since Southern California defeated Tulane in 1932, again is headed toward a meeting of eleven who have met reverses in four games played since 1932. Columbia Stanford has paired two two previous defeated teams while other three clashes have brought one team into Bowl which either had been defeated or tied. The 1937 game already has been assured of one team without clean slate for the Pacific Coast Conference out of which Western defender must come and hasn't a single undefeated or untied team. The best it can offer thus far, are Southern California and Washington State, undefeated but tied, and Washington, unbeaten in Conference competition, but loser to mighty Minnesota. And the way gridiron dynasties are toppling in the East, all land east of the Rockies as far as Rose Bowl consideration is concerned, other team probably also will be one without perfect record.

LOS ANGELES, CALIF..... Henry Armstrong, nearest thing to perpetual motion there is in the ring, moved into commanding spot for feather weight title tonight, when he won clean cut decision from Mike Beloise. Italian boy who held New York title until this contest was ended. Referee Abe Roth gave the decision without hesitancy and he was the right Armstrong who works like battling Nelson, but hits harder, took six of the 10 rounds, with two even and two for Beloise.
