Dear Mr. Mitchell:

Your letters of July 24th and 29th received concerning my inquiry as to the conflicting addresses of my son, Lt. Amon G. Carter, Jr., prisoner of war in Germany, and I want to thank you for your efforts in his behalf and to express my sincere appreciation for your considerate and cooperative assistance in helping to clear this matter up.

Meanwhile, the War Information Bureau of the War Department advise that Oflag 21 B has been renumbered Oflag 64 and is in the vicinity of Shubin Polish Corridor. I am quite sure this is authentic inasmuch as we received a post card from Amon Junior, Saturday, July 31st, which was written July 1st and the address had been blocked out and the new address Oflag 64 stamped in.

Amon Junior indicated that it was quite cold as he said he was sleeping under three blankets and hated to think what the winter would be.

Again thanking you for your sympathetic understanding in my anxiety over my son's location and welfare, I am
