Dear Miss Ayres:

Your letter of February 9 making inquiry as to our last information concerning Amon Junior so that it could be relayed to the mother of Craig Campbell who is a prisoner in the same camp with Amon Junior has been received. Mr. Carter has received several letters written in December and two cards written in January, the 1st and 6th which arrived here February 9. At that time these boys had not been moved and Amon Junior seemed to be getting along fine.

Naturally, it is useless to suggest that Mrs. Campbell not worry, however the quickest any mail has been received from Amon Junior has been 30 to 32 days and we have gone as long as 7 weeks without any word from him. We must realize that the transportation system in Germany and all of Europe for that matter is more or less disrupted and as busy as they must be transporting their own troops and equipment from place to place, they would not exert too much effort trying to get mail and supplies to prisoners of war. Then, too, the boats make only about one trip a month. If the mail should miss one boat, then it runs into the second month before the mail reaches us.

Trusting this information will be of some help to Mrs. Campbell, I am
