Dear Mr. Carter: Received your letter a few days ago and was glad to get the details on Amon Jr. Mrs. Brewster had written that he had been captured, and though that isn't pleasant news it was so much better than the rumors that I had heard. I have waited to answer your letter until I had a chance to see Capt. Pirnie, who commanded Amon Jr.'s battery. I saw him this morning and he is a splendid chap and very definitely thought a great deal of Amon Jr. as an individual and as an officer--he said many very kind things about him. I am sure that you already know this but I know as a father that such news is always welcome; even though it is repeated. I enjoyed receiving the pictures and had the opportunity to show them to Walter Jennings, Stephen Brady and a few others from Fort Worth. Maybe some incident will occur that will get him out soon. I know that he has done his part already; and the rest of the party should be up to some of the rest. The cleanup, I hope, isn't far off. We all have nothing to regret in that we feel that we are trying to do our part but the U.S. is still the best looking soil I have ever seen and Ft. Worth, of course is the best of it. The Texas flag flies daily in our area and wherever you go you do not see a Texan that isn't damn proud of being one and usually isn't very timid about mentioning it. I would like very much to hear the Doctor yell at Adams or Hugh Scarborough. I miss the card room at the club very much. You might mention to the Doctor that the only good cheap thing we can get over here is champagne; price 31 francs per bottle. There is still a little left. The Germans seem to have shipped most of it out of this country. As to pictures, we have difficulty in getting films and about the only way to get them printed is to send them to the base censors who develop the film and send it to the addressee. I will try to get some of the Fort Worth gang in this outfit and send them to you through Mrs. Brewster. Mr. Carter, I sincerely hope that this whole thing works out o.k. for Amon Jr., and I am sure that it will---Maybe, it will not be too long. Good luck to you, and thanks for sending me the information. Tell all the bunch around the club "hello" for me.

V-Mail Service provides the most expeditious dispatch and reduces the weight of mail to and from personnel of our Armed Forces outside the continental United States. When addressed to points where micro-film equipment is operated, a miniature photographic negative of the message will be made and sent by the most expeditious transportation available for reproduction and delivery. The original message will be destroyed after the reproduction has been delivered. Messages addressed to or from points where micro-film equipment is not operated will be transmitted in their original form by the most expeditious means available.

INSTRUCTIONS

- (1) Write the entire message plainly on the other side within marginal lines.
- (2) PRINT the name and address in the two panels provided. Addresses to members of the Armed Forces should include rank or rating of the addressee, unit to which attached, and APO or Naval address.
- (3) Fold, seal, and deposit in any post office letter drop or street letter box.
- (4) Enclosures must not be placed in this envelope and a separate V-Mail letter must be sent if you desire to write more than one sheet.
- (5) V-Mail letters may be sent free of postage by members of the Armed Forces. When sent by others postage must be prepaid at domestic rates (3c ordinary mail, 6c if air mail is desired).
