My dear Captain Bergman:

Your very nice letter of July 23rd received here September 5th and you have no idea how delighted I was to have your letter. Other than appreciating tremendously your thoughtfulness and genoristy in devoting one of your very limited letters to writing me, your letter was the latest word I had received of Amon Junior as my last letter was dated May 10th. Although a few days after receiving your letter, his letter of June 12th arrived.

Naturally, I sent a copy of your letter, to me, immediately to your mother and enclose, herewith, a copy of her acknowledgment. Nothing makes me happier than to know that Amon Junior is thoughtful and considerate of others as the greatest pleasure one can have in life is to make others happy. I consider it a privilege to be able to give any information or word of courage to the various families of the boys who are prisoners of war as I know the anxiety and heartache caused to have our sons, husbands, brothers and loved ones prisoners of war.

Mrs. Hemmsy of Fort Worth, and Mrs. Poteet, have had letters from Oflag 64 as late as July 31st. Mrs. Yardley of Dublin has had letters late in July from her son and yesterday I received a letter from Mrs. Ranck of Austin, Texas, sending me a copy of a snapshot she had received of a group of eight boys in Oflag 64 among which were her husband, Chester Warren of Lempasas and Amon Junior. Gee, but it was wonderful to have this picture which was made in January this year.

I hope you are receiving your parcels and mail with some degree of regularity and that we will have the good fortune to have you boys home soon when we will have a real celebration.
