


Dear Mr. Carter,

I arrived home last month. This my first chance to thank you for the help you gave my mother and father in their attempts to get further information about me after I had been reported missing and captured early in the Tunisian campaign. Both of them got comfort from your letters and calls.

I hope that in the near future the war will end and Amon will get back home. I spent about five days as a German prisoner right after my capture and later, after the Italian armistice, I found myself again in German hands. At all times they treated me well. They tried to observe the conventions of the Geneva Confrence. So I am hopeful that Amon is getting the same adequate treatment. I am sure that he will take the experience in stride and will come home not too much the worse for wear.

As you probably know, I escaped in October of last year and finally got through the lines early in June. I am now in the hospital here for some minor repairs. I want to get back to duty by the first of the year.

Let me hear any good news of Amon and thanks again for your kindness to my family.
