Dear Captain Brown:

Your letter arrived this morning in Mr. Carter's absence from the city and I know that he will be very happy to know that you are back in the States and getting the medical attention that you might need. Any information or comfort that Mr. Carter might have given your family was more pleasure to him, I assure you, than it could have been to your mother and dad.

Up until May of this year we heard frequently, or rather every three or four weeks from Amon Junior. Since that time we have had only three communications -- a card in June, another July 31 and the writer received one dated August 24, but they were only cards and said very little.

Many, many months ago Amon Junior told us that you had escaped and had been recaptured and that was the last information we had about you. I am sure you know that Colonel Drake is interned in the same camp with Amon and that he is the Commanding Officer there. Larry Allen, Associated Press Correspondent, I believe, was interned in Italy at the same time you were and escaped when you did and was recaptured and taken to Oflag 64, which is about 100 miles south of Danzig in the Polish Corridor. Mr. Allen was repatriated in May of this year and is back in New York. He knew and had messages from Amon Junior to Mr. Carter and gave us quite a lot of information about the camp life and activities. This morning, Lt. Meadows of Alabama, who had been repatriated in July from Oflag 64, sent Mr. Carter some kodak pictures taken in the prison camp and Amon Junior was in several of the pictures

and he looked remarkably well considering the life he must have endured.

If you are interested, I am sure that when Mr. Carter returns home, he will be glad to send you copies of some of the letters from Amon telling us of his experiences, capture, etc.

It was nice of you to write and it is always a great event to know that any of you have finally come back home.
