Dear Colonel Bresee:

In August of last year I made inquiry of you as to the regulations on sending books to Prisoners of War in Germany and under date of September 3, you replied and enclosed "instructions for books", for which please accept my thanks.

Mr. Carter's son, 2nd. Lt. Amon G. Carter, Jr., is a prisoner of war in Oflag 64, Germany, and in acknowledging receipt of various books we have sent him on several occasions he has requested magazines instead. We have written him that magazines and newspaper clippings were prohibited. This morning, Mr. Carter received a letter from his son dated December 9th in which he says that "several American magazine parcels have arrived for other officers". Can you explain how other officers are permitted to receive magazines while the instructions from your office say not. I sent a subscription order of one magazine and it came back. If there is any possible way to get magazines to Amon Junior will you please explain how and what magazines.

Thanking you very much for your courtesy and cooperation in this matter as I am sure you can appreciate our desire to comply with every request possible, under the circumstances,
