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Son of Publisher Reported Missing In African Area

Fort Worth, Tex., March 11. AP Second Lt. Amon Carter Jr., 23, son of Amon Carter, publisher of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, today was reported missing in the North Africa action area.

Notification from the adjutant general's office at Washington was that the Texan, who was in the artillery, had been missing since Feb. 14.

A dispatch from the United States forces in Southern Tunisia aid Lt. Carter is believed to be prisoner in German hands.

He was a forward observer for field artillery battalion and was lescribed by his superior officers is "a fine officer."

Lt. Carter graduated from Cul-

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University of Texas in 1941 to enter the service, being assigned to Fort Knox. He had been a reserve officer. Before going to Africa he had been in North Ireland and England.

The dispatch from Tunisia said the Texan had been established in an advance observation post on Lessouda hill facing Faid Pass when a German panzer horde staged a Valentine Day attack, Feb. 14, in that region.
