FORCES IN SOUTHERN TUNISIA, March 3 (Delayed) (P).—Lt.
Amon Carter Jr., a forward observer for a Field Artillery batalion, has been reported missing in action and is believed to be a prisoner in German hands.
Carter, who was described by his superior officers as "a fine officer," was established in an advanced observation post on Lessouda Hill facing Faid Pass when a German panzer horde staged a Valentine's Day attack, Feb. 14, in that region. ach nof es he he
